

GRAZING POLICY IS REVAMPED BY FOREST SERVICE

Under New Practice Ten-Year Permits Will Be Granted to Stockmen — Range Land Is Limited

A new policy was announced today by the United States forest service whereby ten-year permits will be

granted to qualified stockmen dependent upon national forests for summer range.

Regarding the new practice Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River national forest, issued this statement:

"The policy was established consistent with forest service procedure to be of the greatest benefit to local communities and to contribute in the greatest way toward the stabilization and rehabilitation of range property and the stock industry in general.

"Granting of ten-year permits will not only stabilize the industry, it will also permit the rancher to make definite plans for long periods through the provision of a certain amount of national forest range for his use during the summer periods. It will also assist the rancher in securing loans for the carrying out of his operations. It is of special interest to

the financiers making loans to ranchers because it is creating an asset of tangible value which can be used as security for the loans.

For Property Owners

"These term permits will be granted only to qualified stockmen who own sufficient property fully to take care of the stock that they graze on the national forest during the period they are not on the national forest range. Ranch men who do not own property cannot secure term permits. Neither will they be given credit for leased land.

"As far as the Rogue River national forest is concerned, the area where term permits can be granted is limited. A great deal of the range within the national forest boundaries consists of O. & C. and private land. Where the forest service does not have full administration of the land within the range boundaries it is im-

possible to grant privileges extending over a term of years for the reason that lands not fully administered by the forest service are subject to change of administration and ownership.

Zones Established

"Term permits will not be recommended by the supervisor for ranch men who are not wholly engaged in the stock industry but who receive only part of their total income from the ranch through the raising of stock. Ranches located at a distant point from the national forest will not be considered as eligible for term permits. In other words, a definite dependency zone will be established and ranches lying within this dependency zone are those which will be eligible.

"It is not believed that it will be possible to grant term permits for the Applegate and Dead Indian Ju-

ria, a good share of the Butte Falls district and that part of the Rogue River district which is considered as the Trail and Elk Creek countries, for the reason that the forest service does not have full administration of all the land within the national forest boundaries, since approximately one-half of the land in these regions is O. & C."

HOG-CORN PAYMENTS START IN TWO WEEKS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Machinery sent into gear today to pay the nation's corn-hog farmers about \$100,000,000 for their compliance with 1934 and 1935 AAA programs.

Farm administration officials said actual writing of checks to finish payments probably would begin in about two weeks and soon thereafter would proceed rapidly.

HOUSE BUILDING TO EXPAND FAST PINE MAN SAYS

Residential Construction in 1936 Will Double That of 1935 Is View—Need of Much Lumber Seen

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—David T. Mason, manager of the Western Pine association, predicted

today that residential construction in 1936 will be double that of 1935.

This will require a cut of 60,000,000 square feet a quarter, he told delegates to the association convention.

Residential construction was almost at a standstill several years but moved sharply upward last year. However, it would have to double in 1936 and again in 1937 to reach pre-depression levels, Mason said.

The economic committee estimated that 1,744,000,000 board feet of western pine lumber will be needed the first half of 1936. This is 35 per cent of normal production but more than twice the 1934 quota. Mason said the estimate was about right, but pointed out that lumber stocks are mounting rapidly.

He said the western pine has maintained more regular production stock and price averages through the depression than either southern pine

or other west coast softwoods. In 1929, he said, pine business was 43.7 per cent as much as the other two groups but now is 62.7 per cent as much. He attributed part of these gains to the west coast strikes.

Lumber price reductions have been more severe than those of steel, brick or concrete, he said.

DAM TOWN PUBLISHERS CHARGED WITH FORGERY
