**Livestock.**  
**PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP-USA)**—Hogs 500, including 360 direct. Market steady with Thursday's extreme close, or unevenly 15¢ to 20¢ lower than early that day. Good to choice 170-215 lb. drive-ins mostly \$11; load late arrivals unsorted; 230-275 lb., \$10.25 to 10.50; 150-150 lb., \$10.50 to 10.65. Packing sows mostly \$9.25. Few feeder pigs, \$10.50 to \$11.  
**CATTLE** 175, including 31 direct; calves 30, including 18 direct. Market about steady. Few common steers, \$4.75 to \$5.75, some held higher. Good longfeds quotable to \$7.25. Few common heifers, \$4.50 to \$5.75; low cutter and cutter cows, \$3 to \$3.75; common to medium, \$4 to \$5. Good beef cows quotable to \$5.40. Bulls, \$5 to \$5.50. Good to choice vealers mostly \$10 to \$10.50; common to medium, \$7 to \$9.  
**SHEEP** 870, including 385 direct. Two doubles choice 100-lb. fed lambs, steady at \$9.75; lighter quotable to \$10. Drive-ins saleable around \$9.50 down. Good to choice ewes quotable \$4.25 to \$5.

**SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 28.—(AP-USA)**—Cattle 125. Steers strong, package medium 1045-lb. California, \$7.10; good around 850-900-lb. fed steers absent, quoted \$7.50, or slightly above; medium 1070-lb. range cows, \$5.15; two loads good 1055-1095-lb. Oregon fed steers, \$7.25; scattered head good-choice vealers up to \$9.50.  
**SHEEP** none. Good under 85-lb. fed wooled lambs quoted around \$10.50; choice light weight ewes saleable up to \$5.50; late Thursday deck medium-good 82-lb. fed wooled California lambs, \$10.25; medium-good 85-lb. medium pelt yearlings, \$8.00.

**CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—(AP-USA)**—HOGS—7000; weights below 230 lbs., 10 to 15 cents higher than Thursday's average. Heavier weights and sows steady to 10¢ up; top \$10.50; bulk 180 to 250 lbs., \$10.25 to 10.50; 140 to 170 lbs., \$9.10 to 10.50; 240 to 300 lbs., \$9.55 to 10.40; 300 to 350 lbs., \$9.60 to 9.80; sows, \$8.75 to 9.25, few \$9.35.  
**CATTLE**—2000, calves 1000; no strictly good or choice steers here; common and medium grades with a sprinkling of poor grade kinds selling fully steady with week's late advance, or about in line with a week earlier; mainly \$7.00 to \$8.00 market; best \$9.20; stocker and feeder demand slow, steady, confined mainly to thin offerings of value to sell at \$6.75 down; meaty feeders well cleaned up; killers taking everything with flesh as week closes; cutter cows steady; beef cows very dull; bulls and vealers strong.  
**SHEEP**—17,000; fat lambs opening slow; bids and sales 25 to 26¢ and more lower; aged sheep weak; good to choice fed western lambs \$9.25 to 9.50; best higher; most big packer bids at \$9.25; scattered ewes, \$4.00 to \$5.00; western ewes as yet unsold; best held above \$5.25; feeding lambs scarce.

**NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—(AP)**—An unsettled stock market today followed a late break in Montgomery Ward, and early gains were reduced or transformed into losses up to a point or more.  
 Quiet profit taking was in evidence during the greater part of the session. Selling became active in the final hour and the ticker tape fell several minutes behind. Transfers approximated 2,400,000 shares. The close was irregular.  
 The stock of the mail order company dropped nearly 3 points when holders, apparently disappointed at the action of the directors in voting only a 20-cent dividend, began to unload. It was the first Montgomery Ward disbursement, however, since 1930. The issue pared its decline when last-minute support arrived.

## Tasty Desserts Made With Natural Pineapple Juice

WE are all very familiar, of course, with the uses of sliced, diced and crushed pineapple in desserts of various kinds. However, the use of the natural, unsweetened juice of this fruit in making many delectable desserts is comparatively new to the average cook and housewife.  
 So, I am going to suggest here a few desserts which I am certain every member of the family will enjoy. And you may be sure they are tried and tested because I got them from a famous chef and an equally famous dietitian. The latter especially stressed the importance and value of pineapple in the diets of both children and adults. The natural juice is now available everywhere in containers of various sizes.



**Pineapple Sabayon**  
 2 egg yolks  
 2 tablespoons sugar  
 Pinch of salt  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 teaspoon lemon juice  
 Few drops rum flavoring  
 1/2 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice  
 Beat yolks of eggs until thick and creamy, add sugar and place in top of double boiler and continue to beat. Add the pineapple juice and flavoring. Remove beater and stir well with a wooden spoon for 2 minutes longer. Keep water in bottom of the double boiler below the boiling point or the mixture will curdle.  
 Serve hot in small sherbet glasses with a few lady fingers on the plate.  
**Hawaiian Cream**  
 2 tablespoons minute tapioca  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice  
 1/4 cup milk, scalded  
 2 tablespoons sugar  
 1 egg yolk, slightly beaten  
 1/4 cup short shelled coconut  
 1 egg white, stiffly beaten  
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
 Cook tapioca, salt, milk and pineapple juice in double boiler until tapioca is clear, stir frequently. Combine yolk and sugar, pouring a small amount of tapioca mixture over the egg and sugar. Return to double boiler and cook until thickened. Remove from fire and add coconut. Cool, and fold in egg whites and vanilla.  
 Bake Peaches  
 12 medium sized peaches  
 1/2 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 Thin cream  
 Pour boiling water over peaches, rub off skins and place peaches close together in a baking dish. Sprinkle with sugar, pour over the pineapple juice, cover and bake about 20 minutes, then remove cover and allow fruit to brown slightly. Serve hot with thin cream.
