



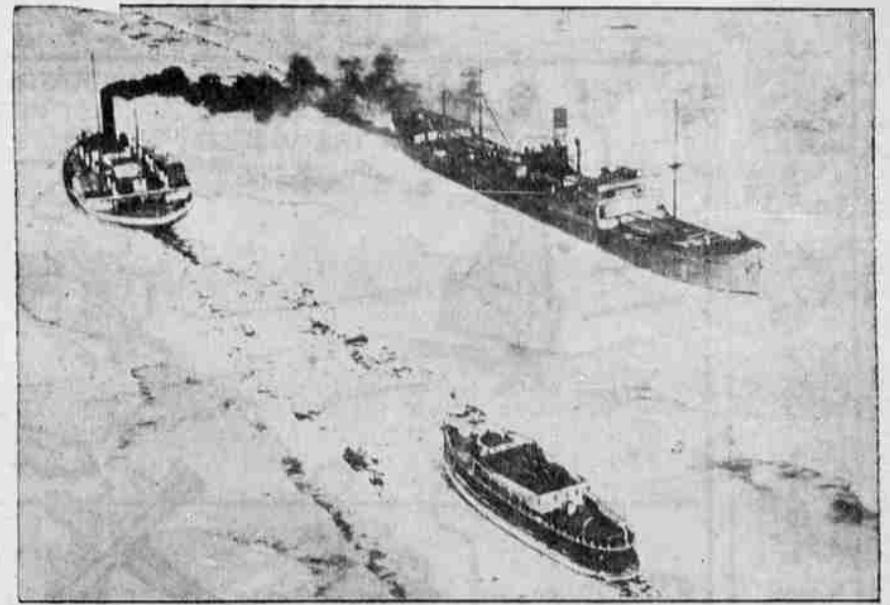

WINTER MAKES GOING TOUGH FOR SHIPS



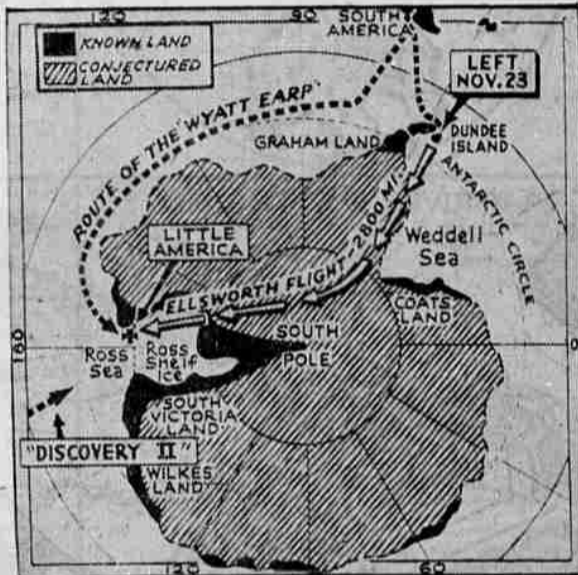

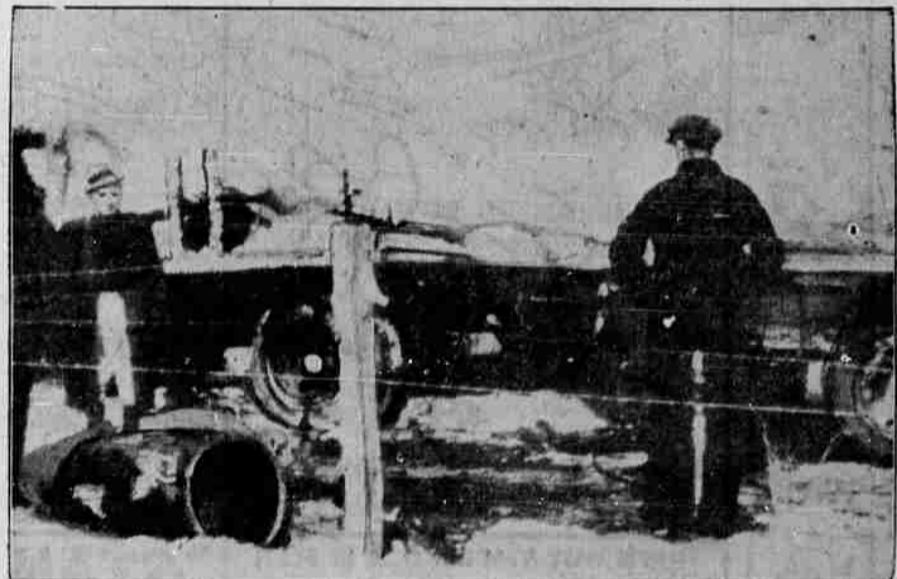
