

George Arliss, in New Delightful Role Stars in Craterian Picture Today

VETERAN STAR HAS INTERESTING PART IN LATE RELEASE

Departing from the usual trappings of grandeur and glamour which have pervaded most of his screen characters, George Arliss, in his latest film play, "Mr. Hobo," opening a three-day run at the Craterian theater today, portrays the genuine knight of the open road, genuinely in love with his vocation.

"Spikes" and his pal, "Flit," go the length and breadth of the countryside, turning a penny here and there at the tinker's trade. They wind up, through a comedy of errors, and the coincidence of a similarity of names, as proprietors of a great bank. But old "Spike" can't stay put. The lure of the road beckons and eventually the two old fellows give up all the luxury and social position and return to the hobo life.

On Wednesday only, one of the most widely praised of the current comedy-romances now on the screen will be at the Craterian for matinee and evening shows—also at the Holly theater for the evening shows only. The picture is "If You Could Only Cook," featuring among the leads Herbert Marshall, Jean Arthur and Leo Carrillo.

When previewed here a few weeks ago, all who saw it were unanimous in their praise of this light-hearted, merrily diverting film entertainment. It shows Marshall as owner of a huge auto concern, tremendously interested in the new streamlining, but being held back by an ultra-conservative board of directors. To forget his troubles, he takes on the air of a man out of a job and, on a park bench, finds Jean Arthur, who really is out of work. Together the two apply for the position of cook and butler in Leo Carrillo's mansion and there, in one rapidly moving comedy sequence after another, romance is born, which takes many hilarious turns before it is worked out satisfactorily.
