## GLASSY BATTLERS DISPLAY WARES IN ELK TEMPLE RING

If the success of last night's OOC fight card at the Elks' temple is an indication of what the future cards will be, the new boxing series will be the best held so far.

In seven good bouts, a number of classy boxers were unveiled before a large crowd last night, giving promise of some real talent being developed here.

Alfred Ramsey, rangy 161-pounder from Wimer, took a well-earned decision over Tiger Curran, 161, Oak Knoll, in the main event. Ramsey, a newcomer, should prove a big favorite here.

Johnny Rowell, 120, Prescott, lost to Nat Lombardo, 119, Oregon Gaves, in a fast bout clinched by an unpopular decision. Rowell's followers claim the little Prescott boy took the first two of the three rounds, and set up a howl when the decision went to Lombardo.

Tommy Karause, 163, Prescott, drew with Wild Man Simmons, 162, Headquarters detachment, in three rounds of awkward but enthusiastic fighting. The boys tore into each other gamely and made up for lack of finesse by slugging each other willingly about the ring.

Bernie Masarek, 164, Prescott, knocked out Charles Knight, 161, Oak Knoll, in another good battle. Masarek had Knight all but out at the end of the first, but the scrappy Oak Knoller rallied at the start of the second and got in several good blows before Masarek pulled him to the canvas with a deliberate right.

Russ Blacksmith, 152, Wimer, defeated Frank Smith, blonde 148-pounder from Prescott, in a battle that had many good moments. Blacksmith is a skilled boxer and should go far in the district. Smith is green but should develop rapidly as he is willing to take punishment.

Joe Luchesi, 140, Oregon Gaves, won a hard-earned decision over Tony Colon, 141, Oak Knoll, in a battle that was full of action from start to finish.

Alfred Carr, 135, Oak Knoll, defeated John Dean, 131, Prescott, in the opening bout on the card.

The next Elks-OOC card will be held Tuesday evening, March 17. Two will be staged in April, with a final outdoor card being held sometime in May, according to present plans.

## EUGENE QUINTET WINS CATHOLIC HOOP TITLE

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## HOPE OF REVENGE WILL SPUR TIGERS IN FRIDAYS CLASH

With nothing hanging in the balance but revenge, the Medford Tigers meet the thrice victorious Ashland Grizzlies on the Medford floor Friday night. It has been announced from Ashland that Howard Mayberry, long-legged Ashland center, will be out of the fray with mumps, and Coach Don Faber has announced that Lee, guard, who has been out for several weeks with a cut hand, will not play against Medford, but will be saved for the state tournament in Salem.

The loss of Mayberry is a distinct one to the Lithians, the big pivot man making many of Ashland's mark-ers against the locals in earlier games. With the Tigers clicking much

better than they have all year, it was hoped here that they would chalk up at least one win over their traditional rivals while those rivals were in playing condition.

Medford, due to the loss of Mayberry and Lee, is given the advantage in the betting for the first time this year. Coach Bowerman of Medford today deplored the loss of the Ashland center, because "I think we could beat them this time, even with Mayberry in there," he said.

Tickets for the game are going fast, a check with the school shows, and a record crowd is expected to witness the encounter. The three Ashland losses are the only ones suffered by the Medford squad this year, and they are anxious to record at least one victory. Interest in the battle is high at the high school, with a huge pep rally planned for the day of the game.

On Saturday the Tigers journey to Roseburg for the last game of the season. In a recent encounter the locals dropped the Indians, 28-18, and are confident of duplicating the performance.

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
