sizing the modern utility of gas for household and commercial uses, Mr. Ward disclosed.

"We are very optimistic about Medford's future," the president said. "Our business here has been steadily expanding and we feel safe in making a large improvement investment in this city. Business last year showed a 30 percent increase over that of 1934 despite a rate reduction made during the year."

Mr. Ward declared that as the volume of business increases the public may expect other reductions in rates. The president arrived here by motorcar Sunday from his San Francisco headquarters to complete arrangements for the expansion program. He was to return to the Bay city today.

As part of the company's educational program a cooking school will be opened soon in the Bremen apartment building at 24 South Grape street, it was announced by D. E. York, vice president and general manager of the gas company. Mrs. Ann Cheney of Portland, home economist, will be in charge of the school which is intended to show the efficiency of gas for cooking.

In its educational campaign the company will also feature heating plants and appliances. In recent weeks, Mr. York said, gas heating systems have been installed in several Medford homes. In the model home to be created here under supervision of the federal housing administration the company will install a gas heating system and a water heater, Mr. York said.

Southern Oregon Gas corporation has been in business here since 1912. It was acquired January 1, 1935, by the Republic Electric Power corporation which operates in Oregon, California and Oklahoma.
