Departing from the ordinary in presenting a singing star in a role different from the usual opera characterizations. "Rose of the Rancho," which introduces Gladys Swarthout to motion picture fans, is in reality an outdoor adventure drama, with a musical background. John Boles is co-starred.

Charles Bickford, Willie Howard, Herb Williams, Grace Bradley and H. B. Warner have featured roles in the supporting cast.
