The army and navy and included representatives of both major parties, the comparatively liberal Minseito, which supported Okada, and the Seiyukai, which opposed the former government.

Six members of the house of peers were included.

Hirotaka undertook double duties as premier and foreign minister, yielding to the army's insistence that Shigeru Yoshida, whom he had proposed for the foreign ministry, be discarded.

Keinosuke Uehara, former vice minister for home affairs, also assumed two portfolios, those of home affairs and education.

Others ministers named were: War—Count Ichiji Terauchi. Navy—Admiral Otsu Nagano. Finance—Hideo Baba.

Justice—Raisaburo Hayashi, the chief justice of the supreme court. Agriculture and forestry—Fosuke Shimada.

Commerce and industry—Takakichi Kawasaki.

Communications—Keikichi Tanomogi.

Railways—Yonezo Manda.

Colonies—Hideo Nagata, the former mayor of Tokyo.

Kawasaki and Tanomogi are leaders of the Minseito party; Shimada and Manda of the Seiyukai party.

Hirotaka and Kawasaki holdovers from the Okada cabinet.

A foreign office spokesman said the cabinet pledge for a "positive, independent readjustment of foreign relations" meant a "settlement of outstanding issues with other nations by peaceable means."

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"Rehearsals, however, will continue," he said, "and the play will be presented as soon as we can procure an auditorium that is accessible to the public and equipped for a dramatic production."

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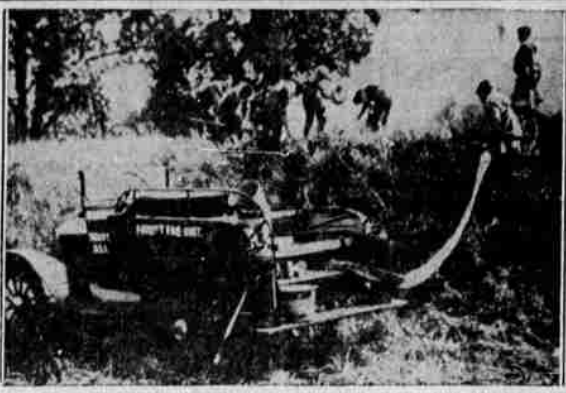
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Daily Good Turn Pledged

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ONE WEEK LEFT FOR TAX FILING

This is the last week for filing 1935 federal income tax returns, Eric Gray, deputy collector, warned today.

The filing period ends at midnight next Monday, a day later than usual because the 15th, customary closing date, falls on Sunday. Persons who do not file by next Monday midnight become delinquent and thus subject to a 5 percent penalty, Mr. Gray emphasized.

Mr. Gray will be in his office on the third floor of the postoffice building every day this week to assist taxpayers in preparing their returns. Friday and Saturday Mr. Gray will remain in his office until 9 p. m. and on next Monday until midnight, he said. His office is opened each morning at 8:30.

"I cannot too strongly urge tax payers who need help in preparing returns to consult me as early as possible," Mr. Gray said. "It will be impossible to serve everyone if there is a last-minute rush."

Clerence F. Davies, for the past eight years superintendent of the Eagle Point schools, and with twenty years experience teaching in Oregon schools, has filed his candidacy for the office of county school superintendent of Jackson county. Davies is regarded as an able educator, and is well known in the Eagle Point district, and among teachers of Jackson county.

County School Superintendent C. R. Bowman has filed his declarations of intention of seeking re-election at the May primary.

Under a recently passed Oregon law, candidates for the office of school superintendent run on a non-partisan ticket, the same as the justices of the state supreme court.

ASHLAND, March 9.—(Spl.)—The regular stated meeting of Hillah Temple of the Mystic Shrine at the Masonic Temple in Ashland Friday evening, was largely attended and representative of the membership in Klamath Falls, Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland.

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GOOD GARDENING



Sweet Peppers

Sweet peppers are high in favor of home gardeners everywhere, because six or eight good plants will feed the ordinary family—but they're delicate and must be handled very carefully. In both north and south the seed must be started indoors and the plants transplanted after all danger of frost is past. Two transplantings are better in the north, so that the plants are quite large when it comes time to set them out in the garden. Once in the garden plants should be propped up, by use of stakes as tomatoes are handled. The planting season runs from early March in the south to early June in the far north.

E. P. FROG RAISER AWAITING CROAKS

EAGLE POINT, March 9.—(Spl.)—Floyd Pearce, the frog tycoon of the Eagle Point district, is anticipating the first croaks of spring from his several thousand amphibians in mid-April, he has announced. Last year he bought several pairs of mating frogs from New Orleans, constructed a large pond for them, and planted pond lilies.

Basking on lily pads during last summer, the frogs became quickly oriented and reproduced thousands of tad-poles. (One pair of adult frogs will produce about 12,000 tadpoles in a year.) The tadpoles disappeared in the fall and are now hibernating in the mud on the bottom of the ponds, it is believed.

In March, Pearce expects to send to New Orleans for four more pairs, and it is expected that frog legs will be a table delicacy as common here as fried eggs in a few more years.

ROGUE COWS THIRD IN STATE AVERAGE

Rogue River Herd Improvement association was rated third in the average production of butterfat in the state, according to the association's January report issued today.

The association's highest rating for herds of more than 20 cows went to E. B. Poyer who has 23 purebred and grade Jerseys. The herd average was 689 pounds of milk and 39.5 pounds of butterfat.

Top rating for herds of 12 to 20 cows went to C. J. Hunter, who has 16 purebred and grade Jerseys. The herd average was 689 pounds of milk and 39.5 pounds of butterfat.

George H. Stowell's ten purebred Guernseys were rated highest for herds under 12 cows. The average was 742 pounds of milk and 38.5 pounds of butterfat.

TAX PAYMENTS BRISK AT SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Tax payments continue brisk in the collection department of the sheriff's office. With next Monday as the final date for first quarter payment of current taxes, without penalty, this week is expected to see a rush of taxpayers.

Payments so far have been slightly better than last year, with considerable delinquent taxes being paid.

The coming week will also see tax payments by corporations, including the California Oregon Power company, the Rogue River Timber company, the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, and gasoline concerns. The Southern Pacific railroad, with a check for approximately \$73,000 is the only corporation payer to date.
