TOURISTS VEXED BY STATE CHECK AGAINST INSECTS

SACRAMENTO, Cal. (UP)—Tens of thousands of tourists long have complained because California has agricultural inspection stations at the border and all incoming motor cars must be submitted to close scrutiny and delay.

Officials of the state department of agriculture, however, insist that there is a real need for the inspections because countless attempts are made to bring in dangerous insects and plant diseases.

A Bangor, Maine, tourist was stopped at the Suanvini station. He insisted he had no contraband plant material or insects with him.

Inspection of the car was made by the average tourist automobile, but they shudder when they think of green moths, all alive and doing well despite the long trip from Maine.

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LIABILITY LAWS ON CAR MISHAPS PROMOTE SAFETY

WASHINGTON (UP)—The law now reaches across most of the state lines throughout the country to compel payment of damages caused by non-resident motorists, according to a report from the American Automobile Association.

Residents of 42 states and the District of Columbia now have the protection of non-resident, service-of-process laws, the A. A. A. statement said. Ten jurisdictions have adopted such legislation during the past year and with the exception of Colorado, Georgia, Missouri, Nevada and Utah, the non-resident service laws are now in effect throughout the country.

"Prior to passage of the laws, the injured party was forced to file suit for damages in the state in which the motorist causing the accident was resident," the report said.

With the non-resident service-of-process law in effect, however, the accused driver is forced to answer the suit in the state in which the accident occurred.

"When a non-resident motorist enters a state with such a law," the statement continued, "he automatically appoints the commissioner of motor vehicles as his lawful attorney authorizing him to accept service of process in a civil liability suit.

"The motorist is informed of the action by mail.

"Should he fail to respond to the suit, and judgment be returned against him, the court of the state in which the damages was jurisdiction to collect the damages.

ANCIENT PEAR TREES SHOW RENEWED VIGOR

SAN RAFAEL, Cal. (UP)—Two pear trees, planted more than a century ago by Franciscan fathers, give every indication of again bearing their annual crop this summer.

For half a dozen years past, the "crop" of the ancient pear trees has not exceeded from four to six pears each year.

One of the trees still stands on the spot where it was originally planted in 1818, presumably by Father Vendre Fortson, one of the founders of the Mission St. Rafael Archangel. The second one was transplanted from its original orchard site to Boy's Park in San Rafael by the Women's Improvement club.
