

SELLING POINTS GIVEN DEALERS IN U. S. TIRES

Twenty-five service station operators from various points in southern Oregon gathered at Hotel Medford Tuesday night to hear a sales address concerning United States tires, by U. D. Carnes, representative of the General Petroleum Corporation's tire department. R. SAITO SUICIDES IN ABERDEEN, WN.

Word was received in this city today, that R. Saito, 54, former well-known local Japanese resident had committed suicide Tuesday morning at Aberdeen, Wash. Saito was approaching blindness, and death of kin in Japan was given as the cause of the act. He is a cousin of K. Saito of this city.

Twenty years ago R. Saito was a member of the then small local Japanese colony, and the driver of a laundry wagon. Later, he opened an art store here. A former officer in the Japanese army, and a man of command size for his race, he was a leader in the local Japanese-American society. He was married, and had two sons, Berry Saito and Abraham Saito, the former now attending college in Japan.

After leaving this city Saito engaged in the exporting business in New York City and Aberdeen.

The past year Saito has been suffering from a facial ailment, that threatened blindness, and has been in poor health. This coupled with the death of his father and two sisters in Japan, caused melancholia.

News of his death came as a shock to Medford Japanese.

TAX PAYMENTS HEAVY AS DEADLINE NEARS

Fireless Smoking Gives Nicotine in Purer Form

TORONTO, March 11.—(AP)—Fireless cigarettes, cigars and pipes, in which the tobacco smokes, but never burns, were announced today by W. J. McCormick.

They smoke by electric heaters which take the advantage of a peculiar difference between the nicotine and other substances forming tobacco.

The inventor, a physician who does not smoke, discovered the difference while making laboratory experiments on effects of nicotine on laboratory animals.

He noted that the nicotine and its aromatic products in tobacco are in the form of an oil which turns into

smoke at the lower temperature than that of burning tobacco. He found that electric heaters, set so as never to ignite the tobacco, will convert the nicotine and aromatics into smoke.

The heaters are two types. For pipes they are built into the bowls. For cigars and cigarettes they are holder-shaped ovens into which the entire cigar or cigarette is thrust. The smoker has to have his pipe or holder plugged into a light or other electrical connection.

All the nicotine which the smoker likes, Dr. McCormick says, is obtained by the fireless method.

"The smoke," he says, "is not quite so dense as ordinary cigarette or cigar smoke, and does not seem to linger in the atmosphere in visible form."

among the principal first rank figures surviving him.

Earl Beatty, whose dashing conduct in the battle of Jutland and other engagements won him a place as a navy hero, succumbed to complications arising from a severe cold he suffered last fall.

He left his sick bed Nov. 26 for the funeral of Earl Jellicoe, his predecessor as navy commander-in-chief afloat.

"So Jellicoe is gone," he said then. "I feel that I will be the next to be summoned. I don't think the call will be very long. I am tired, very tired."

Two months later, on Jan. 28 he left his sick bed again to take part in the funeral of King George.

His eldest son and heir to the title, Viscount Borodale, his doctor, and a nurse were at the bedside at death.

Today, old sailors who once obeyed his commands at sea, filed past his deathbed, some weeping openly.

Earl Beatty retired as admiral of the fleet when he reached the age limit of 65, Jan. 17.

The funeral services will be next Monday in St. Paul's cathedral and his body will be buried there.

GROVE ASSESSED FINE FOR HIGHWAY SMASHUP

Ross K. Grove of this city, entered a plea of guilty in justice court yesterday to reckless driving and was fined \$25 and costs, and ordered to pay for damages to an auto he crashed into on the Pacific highway near the junction with the old Pacific highway.

Grove was charged with colliding with another auto, while driving in a reckless manner. Grove claimed he was not travelling over 40 miles per hour, and was unable to explain the cause of the crash.

Grove paid the costs amounting to \$4.50, and the court ruled he could pay the fine at the rate of \$10 per week.

TAX DRAFTERS TO KEEP TREASURY'S FIGURES SECRET

committee so "I can't say anything."

Making Progress
Vinson did add, however, that the members "are making progress" and he is "beginning to see the light."

It was learned privately that new tax tables were handed over today by treasury experts in which the highest rate submitted was below the 75 per cent maximum suggested by the treasury yesterday in the event the subcommittee should insist on providing corporations with a reserve exempt from taxes or taxed at a low rate, on which to lean during "rainy days."

The 75 per cent rates were described by one committeeman as entirely impractical because "not a dime" would be collected under them.

Rather than pay such rates to be permitted to put a large share of undivided income into reserves, it was asserted, corporations would distribute such net income among stockholders, who would pay income taxes upon the dividends.

Hill did say for publication that yesterday's drastic tables were "based on impractical assumptions," since they were drawn up on a basis of either 100 per cent distribution, or 100 per cent retention of net corporate income. No corporation is going to conduct operations along such lines, he said.

Molinar and Michell are accused in the indictment of defrauding Rogue River valley turkey growers, by failing to pay for holiday consignments to the San Francisco markets. District Attorney George A. Coddington estimates that between \$5,000 and \$7,500 for approximately 16,000 pounds of turkeys are involved. Turkey growers of all sections of the county are represented on the list of complainants.

John Nelson of the Beagle district, one of the largest consignors, claims \$1,500 for 6,000 pounds of turkeys. Growers of the Sams Valley, Eagle Point and Applegate districts are also concerned.

Molinar and Michell, as partners, operated as the Bear Fruit and Produce company, for four years, in this city and valley. They were indicted by the last grand jury, and the true bills kept secret until their arrest.
