Mrs. Carpenter To Accompany Guest

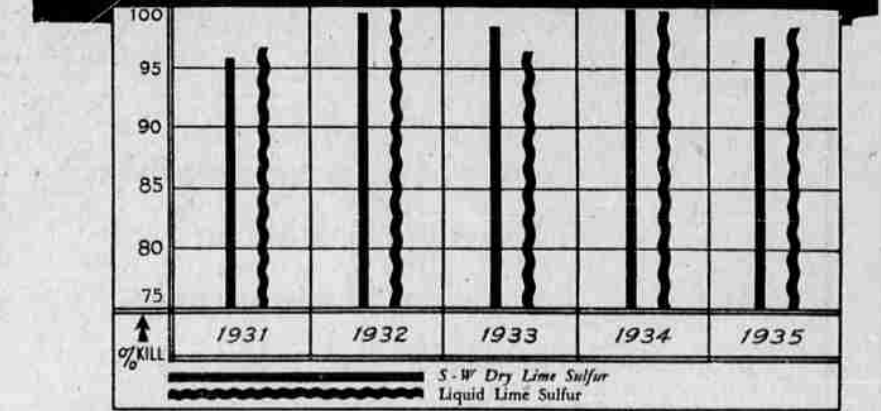
Leaving last night, were Mrs. A. S. V. Carpenter, her two children and her mother, Mrs. John Gilbert Blue, who boarded a southbound train.
