

### LOCAL NET TEAM PRIMED TO FIGHT FOR CCC TROPHY

John Wood and Edward Camp will start as guards, while others who will probably see action are Ray Wirtz, John Cain and Alford Handies.

manently or temporarily, and military maneuvers of any kind, as well as the upkeep of all permanent works for mobilization, are in the same way forbidden.

As the conference broke up, it was reported that the British government had suggested to Germany that it should withdraw all but a "symbolic" number of troops from the Rhineland and should undertake not to fortify the zone for a period at least long enough for a treaty to be negotiated and the international situation "regularized."

The foreign office announced that an assurance had been received from Hitler that the present German forces in the Rhineland would not be increased.

However, it was said, this gesture fell short of the conciliatory move the British had hoped from the German leader.

It was said that Hitler's latest move followed a direct appeal by the British government through the German ambassador here.

Last night, after a cabinet meeting, Foreign Secretary Eden sent for Ambassador Von Hoesch and told him it would be difficult to exaggerate how gravely the British government viewed the present situation.

### AMERICAN RISE IN ART IS FORECAST BY NOTED PAINTER

PARIS (UP)—Modern painting is neither better nor worse than the art of the past, according to Suzanne Valadon, 30-year-old French painter and mother of an equally famous painter, Maurice Utrillo. Mme. Valadon, who held an exhibition in Paris in January, says that modern painting is merely another link in the chain which connects the art of the past with the art of the future.

"Thus our modern painting must serve as an education for the painters of the future, whose work will be something entirely new and unexpected," said the veteran artist. "Much of the fine artistic work of the future will come from America. I am convinced that this young and enthusiastic race soon will produce very fine art. Whistler, whom I knew and appreciated as a fine painter, is the forerunner and pioneer of American art. His influence has been and will continue to be great."

In a little home perched on the butte of Montmartre, with doors loose on their hinges, the small porch falling into disrepair, lives France's great impressionist painter, Suzanne Valadon.

Suzanne Valadon is a brunette with horn rimmed glasses. Once a very popular model in the Latin quarter, she says with pride, "Men used to say my paintings were good because I was young and pretty, but now they say so because it is the truth."

"The Eccentric," as she was called in the Latin quarter, had a varied and romantic life. A founding, she was brought up by peasants and when very young joined a circus troupe. Shortly afterward Degas, noted French painter, asked the pretty little circus performer to pose for him, soon discovering that his model had much talent herself. Degas taught her and influenced her work in the early days.

Suzanne Valadon had already had considerable success at 15 when her first and only child, Maurice Utrillo, was born. The father of the child was said to be an obscure painter of the Latin quarter, Michel Utrillo, a Spanish admirer of Suzanne Valadon, adopted the child.

The mother forced the boy to paint and he soon became as famous as his mother. Although said to be weakened by excesses, Utrillo's talent has never decreased.

### PIN BALL DEVICES NOT A LOTTERY

EUGENE, Ore., March 12.—(AP)—Operation of pin-ball machines does not constitute lottery, Judge G. F. Skipworth ruled in circuit court here yesterday when he sustained demurrers to indictments of seven Lane county persons accused of promoting and abetting lotteries in connection with the operation of pin-ball machines.

Judge Skipworth referred the cases back to the grand jury. At the time he announced his ruling, Judge Skipworth declared in his opinion the act of the 1935 legislature permitting licensing and regulation of pin-ball machines unconstitutional.

### FLAT TAX PLAN HOLDS DANGER

PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—(AP)—The Oregon Business & Investors, Inc., circulated a bulletin today stating the proposed \$10 flat tax constitutional amendment would impede Oregon's graduated income tax.

The proposed amendment provides for a flat \$10 tax on \$2500 or less of real property, provided it is owned by a citizen of Oregon. This, the bulletin stated, would cause loss of revenue from small property and necessitate even greater burdens on larger holdings or other sources of revenue.

Post 1925, Veterans of Foreign Wars, obtained the ballot title for the flat tax.

Those surviving are Vernon D. Harvey, J. and Robert H. Field; also his wife, Grace Field, of Medford, and four grandchildren.

The family came to Medford in 1910 where they have since resided.

Funeral services will be held at the Conger chapel at 2 p. m. Saturday with the Rev. W. F. Shields, former pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment will follow in the Bessyou Memorial park.

### PRODUCTION LOAN ASSURANCE GIVEN

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt assured the senate agriculture committee today he would make \$13,000,000 of emergency funds available for crop production loans effective March 20 and more money up to \$30,000,000 as needed.

In a letter sent the committee and read to its members, by Chairman Smith (D., S. C.), the president said it was "not practicable" to make the entire \$30,000,000 immediately available. He said additional money would be supplied "as rapidly as possible and in ample time to meet the needs of the farm credit administration."

(Farmers may borrow up to \$200 for seed and feed. The government takes a first lien on the crop as security.)

### SEARCH IS MADE FOR BONES OF 2 EXTINCT CALIFORNIA ANIMALS

SISKIYOU, Cal.—(UP)—California University authorities have undertaken to reconstruct the existence of two species of animals that once inhabited the great lava beds between the Sierra Nevada mountains to the north and the Cascades to the south.

These are the lava bear and the lava sheep. Both have become extinct. Scientists are convinced that at the time of the early settlement of California they actually existed, and they hope not only to establish this definitely but to find enough bones of the extinct animals to reconstruct skeletons and establish their relations with other species of bear and sheep in surrounding mountains.

All inhabitants of the country have been asked to send in any existing relics they may have of such animals, and eye-witness accounts of having actually seen them.

### Stomach In Lung Is Corrected By Careful Surgery

OAKLAND, Calif., March 12.—(AP)—A 2 1/2-year-old boy, born with his stomach, spleen and intestines shoved into his left lung, was recovering here today from a delicate operation to correct the place of the organs.

Fascia, or connective tissue from the mother was used in aligning the misplaced organs by the surgeon, whose name was not revealed.

The baby, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leander Roethler, could breathe with but one lung before the operation, because the displacement had collapsed the other.

His mother thought he had influenza when she took him to a hospital where X-ray pictures revealed the unique condition.
