

# ETHIOPIA DISPUTE MUST BE SETTLED FIRST, SAYS DUCE

powers her dispute with Ethiopia must be settled before she could participate actively in smoothing out the Rhineland embroglio.

**Feels Morally Bound**  
(An informed Italian source told the Associated Press in Rome that Italy feels morally bound to protest against sanctions being applied to Germany.)

In view of the fact Great Britain, with the consent of France, made the Italo-Ethiopian war a test case for League of Nations sanctions, the Italians were said to have taken the stand "No British or French statesman now can go to Italy and ask the Italian people to fight for them in any eventuality whatsoever."

The same condition, it was said, applies to any new "Locarno" pact which might be formed since, without Italy's support, any agreement reached would be merely an Anglo-French pact.

**Flaindlin Embarrassed**  
The position of Pierre-Etienne Flaindlin, French foreign minister, was made delicate by Italy's stand.

The demand in France for sanctions against Italy was said to be so strong he was, in effect, placed in the position of saying: "I can't go back to France and tell the French people they are less important than Ethiopia; Emperor Haile Selassie can get what we can't."

Ambassador Von Hoersch remained in the foreign office only a short time. He said he had not talked to Locarno signatories but he declined to say whether he had talked to Anthony Eden, the British foreign secretary.

It was immediately rumored through Whitehall that Eden had given the German envoy a request signed by Great Britain, France, Belgium, and Italy that Hitler make a compulsory move.

Combined with the foreign office announcement of an "open door," observers were given the impression that the British were still hopeful that the international situation might be eased and the impasse between Germany and France broken peacefully.

# BEER DISTRIBUTOR SHORN OF LICENSE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 13.—(AP)—The Oregon state liquor commission ruled that the Albert's Products company no longer may act as beer distributor. The firm was charged with cutting beer prices in violation of state regulations.

Arthur K. McMahon, chairman, said "the revocation is final as far as we are concerned."

The commission also named Acting Administrator Otto J. Runtz permanent administrator, suspended one beer license, refused applications for five others and discussed a proposal to compel members of "clubs" to purchase liquor-buying permits as a means to control private profits resulting from club licenses to sell mixed drinks.

# PLUMP TEACHER LOSES APPEAL

ALBANY, N. Y., March 13.—(AP)—State Education Commissioner Frank P. Graves today denied the appeal of Miss Rose Pretalater from a ruling of the New York city board of education she could not hold a teaching license because she was overweight. She weighed 182 pounds.

Commissioner Graves based his ruling on a legal technicality. Miss Pretalater's appeal, he said, was not filed within the required time. He did not discuss her weight, but he said in his opinion:

"Of course, weight is not an important factor in determining a person's efficiency as a teacher. The remedy, however, is through the local school authorities. . . . The commissioner of education may not substitute his judgment for the judgment of such authorities."

**G. PASS IRRIGATION REFINANCING ASKED**  
PORTLAND, Ore., March 13.—(AP) The Grants Pass Irrigation District petitioned the federal court here for approval of financial reorganization under corporate bankruptcy laws.

Ninety-seven per cent of the bondholder-creditors of the district signified their approval of the plan, which calls for payment of 18.481 cents on every dollar of indebtedness the petition stated.

District debts were listed at \$1,510,000. It was stated the reconstruction finance corporation will give financial aid.

**PINE BUSINESS HOLDS UP TREND**  
PORTLAND, Ore., March 13.—(AP) New lumber business of 111 mills in the Western Pine association for the week ending March 7 was nine per cent greater than for the preceding week, the association reported today.

The mills reported orders for 52,870,000 feet, shipments of 48,199,000 feet and production of 35,711,000 feet.

For the corresponding week a year ago the same mills showed orders of 57,429,000 feet and production 32,320,000 feet. So far this year orders are four per cent above the corresponding period last year.

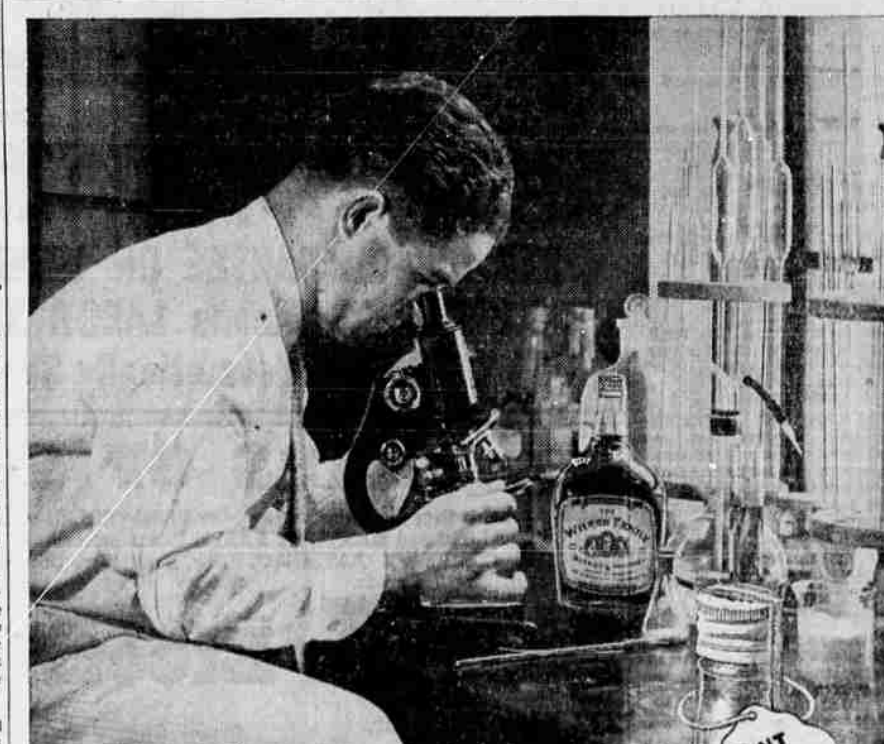
