

MOVIE FLYER TO STAGE THRILLERS OVER CITY TODAY

A thrilling, heart-palpating aerial show over the Medford municipal airport today was promised last night by Norman Deming, production manager of Columbia Pictures corporation, which has been taking air scenes here since last Tuesday for its latest thrill-drama, "Devil's Squadron."

The entire Columbia staff, which came to Medford to make the air scenes, will be on hand today to film the final pictures before returning to Hollywood, Mr. Deming said. The group came here in search of clouds which are necessary for background.

All during the week hundreds of spectators visited the airport daily to witness the dare-devil exploits in the air. The picture, which co-stars Richard Dix and Karen Morley, is a drama of the life of test pilots.

"Tomorrow," Mr. Deming said last night, "we are going to put on a real show. The weather bureau said we'd have perfect clouds and we're going to take advantage of them. We expect to complete our work here, and we're going to open up and shoot the works."

Mr. Deming said there is no objection to spectators being at the airport. He declared they would be welcome. To keep spectators out of danger some special patrolmen will be on duty today, he said.

"We have had grand success in Medford," Mr. Deming stated. "If we hadn't been able to find clouds here I don't know where we would have gone, for there weren't any anywhere else."

The Columbia staff which will be at the airport today includes Frank Clarke, rated as one of the most spectacular stunt pilots in the country; Charles Marshall, master aerial cameraman; Red Toimie, assistant cameraman; Ralph Miller, studio technician; Frank Tomick, pilot of the camera ship; Floyd Clevinger and Paul Lansing, pilots, the latter being a former Medford resident; and Jack Rawlins, film editor. The group arrived last Monday in three planes.

FRANK NEWMAN IN PROSECUTOR RACE

Frank J. Newman, Medford attorney, was yesterday officially listed as Salem as a candidate for the Republican nomination for district attorney of Jackson county. His filing was recorded and announced at the secretary of state's office.

Mr. Newman has practiced law here for many years. He was graduated from Minnesota State university in 1902 and practiced law in Minnesota and the Dakotas until 1906 when he came to Medford. He has continued to practice here since then.

He is a member of the Medford Rotary club, the Col. Sargent post of the United Spanish American War Veterans, both the York and Scottish Rite Masonic orders and Hillab Temple Shrine of which he is a past potentiate.

He is the third Republican to file for nomination for district attorney, the others being Victor A. Tengvold and F. Kraemer Deuel, George Coding Incumbent, the only Democrat to file thus far.

CHOIRS REHEARSE LENTEN CANTATA THIS AFTERNOON

In preparation for the presentation of the beautiful lenten cantata, "Seven Last Words of Christ," the first combined rehearsal will be held today at 4 p. m. in the auditorium of the Methodist church. Invitations have been extended to choirs of the city and a chorus of 90 is expected to be present at this first of the four Sunday afternoon rehearsals leading up to the week of the presentation.

Solo parts are to be sung by Mrs. C. H. Paske, Ralph Waldron and W. P. Brooks. Piano accompaniment will be one of Medford's best known pianists, Mr. Sebastian Apollo. Arrangements are being completed for an organist. A grand piano is to be brought in for the occasion through the courtesy of Palmer's Music and Electric store. The performance is to be under direction of Don Huksabe.

A cordial invitation is extended all singers of southern Oregon who desire to participate in the cantata to be present at the rehearsal. It will be necessary for all who intend to sing to be at the four Sunday afternoon rehearsals without fail.

This is the first time in the history of southern Oregon that "The Seven Last Words" has been presented by a local organization, and it promises to be an affair of unusual interest. Special scenic effects are being arranged to add to the effectiveness of the performance.

PIONEER LADY OF COUNTY PASSES

Mrs. Bernette (Naylor) Griffin, pioneer resident and one of the oldest native daughters of Jackson county now living, passed away at her residence on South Ivy street Saturday afternoon at the age of nearly 80.

Mrs. Griffin was born on Wagner creek southwest of Talent near the old Naylor sawmill, the first sawmill in Jackson county, and was reared by her father, Granville Naylor, and has spent practically all her life here. Griffin, also a pioneer and native son of this county, she leaves three children, Everett Griffin of Trinidad, Calif.; Lawrence of Bly, Ore., and Abby Bailey of Merrill, also seven grand children and one sister, Alta Naylor, of this city.

Mrs. Griffin was a member of the Christian church. Funeral arrangements with Conger Funeral Parlors await the arrival of relatives and will be announced in Monday's issue of this paper.

NEW ROTARY PLOW FOR CRATER ROADS

A new rotary snow plow for service at Crater Lake national park is scheduled to arrive here by freight Tuesday. It will be driven from here to the park.

The new machine will augment the one now in use at the mountain resort and it is expected by David H. Canfield, park superintendent, that with the two plows in operation no further difficulty will be experienced in keeping roads and an adequate parking space open at all times.

The present plow broke down a couple of months ago and snow piled up so fast while it was out of commission that attempts to keep the rim road and a parking area open had to be abandoned. Efforts are now being made to clear the road to the lake rim. When that is completed a parking space will be cleared, Mr. Canfield said.

The new machine is the latest model of snow plow made, being equipped with a drift-digging attachment. It is the largest plow ever to be used in the park, Mr. Canfield related.

EXTENSION ASKED FOR F.H.A. CLAUSE

A plea that title 1 of the federal housing act be extended by congress was sent yesterday by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce to Senator Charles L. McNary, Senator Frederick Steiwer and Representative James W. Mott, congressman from this district.

The three legislators were urged to use their influence in having title 1 of the act extended beyond March 31, when it is to expire unless congress provides for a continuance.

It is title 1 that provides easy financing for the purchase of household equipment and the reconditioning of homes. Thus far congress has shown no inclination to extend this part of the act beyond March 31.
