## Ashland Club Sends Invitation To Hear Art Lecture Friday

An invitation has been issued the Medford branch of the American Association of University Women by the Ashland group to the lecture of Dr. Jiro Harada, commissioner of the Imperial Household Museum of Tokyo, to be given in the ballroom of the Hotel Lathia next Friday afternoon at 4:30.

Dr. Harada is recognized as the greatest authority on Oriental art of the present day, and has been sent to America this year for the Society for International Cultural Relations of Japan.

He has lectured at the University of Oregon during the fall and winter terms, and will appear at other Pacific coast colleges during the spring and summer. Dr. Harada has spent more time than any other living scholar in the ancient repository of the Imperial Household Museum, which holds the priceless collection of the emperors who flourished during the eighth century. The treasures of the museum are unique in being the only fragile relics of so ancient a day.

A tea in the hotel dining room will follow Dr. Harada's lecture, when guests will be able to meet the speaker personally. There is no admission charge.
