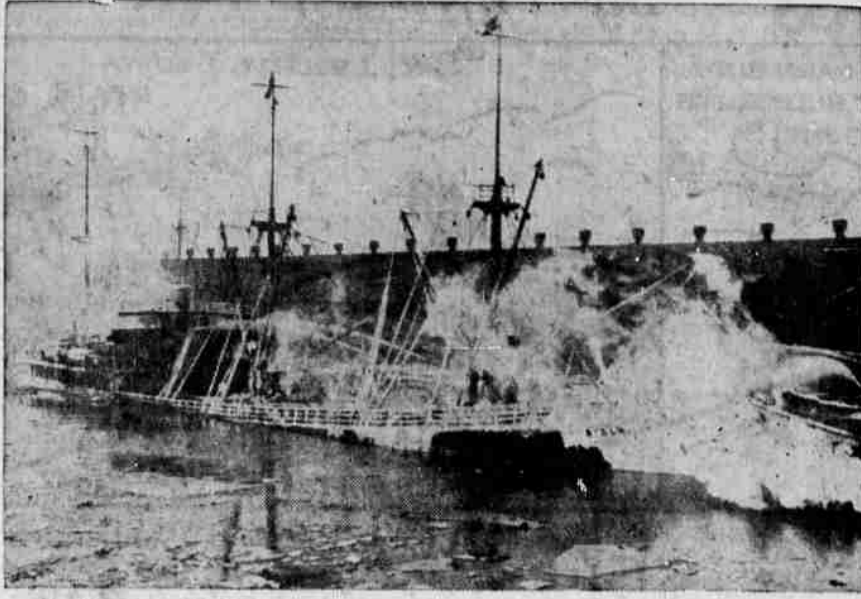


Machine Gun Seller

SLIDE SURVIVORS FIGHT STORM



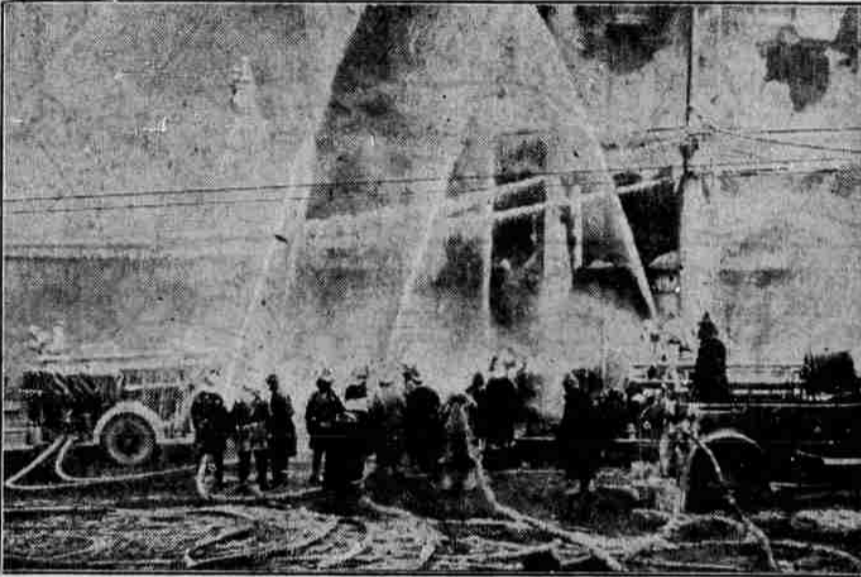

Death Takes Ritchie



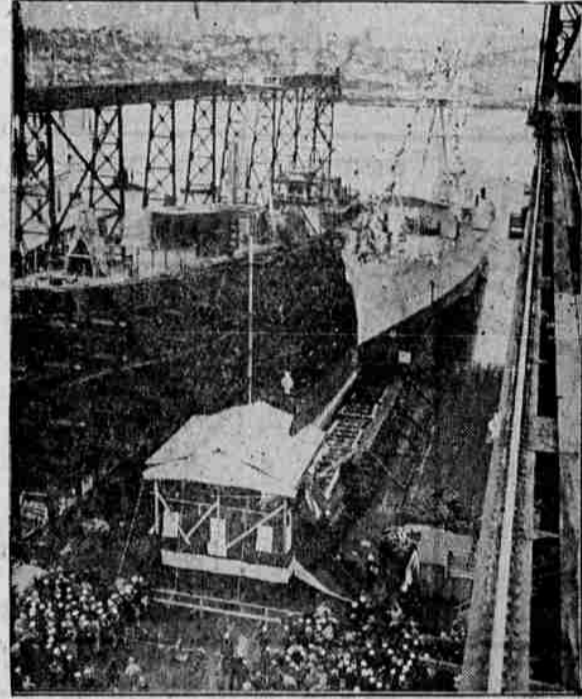

SHOW THOSE YANKS HOW, JOE



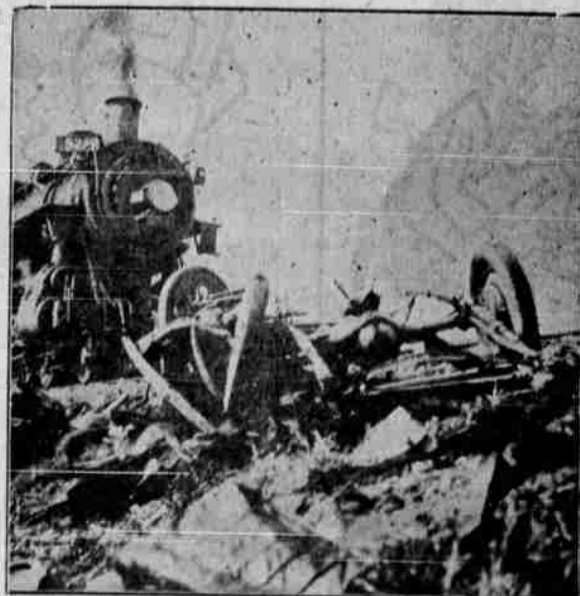
