

# Corvallis High Wins State Quint Title; Routs Franklin 34 to 20

## BIG BENTON FIVE WINS DECISIVELY; 'B' CHAMPS THIRD

Bellfountain Downs Mac Hi, 29 to 17—Astoria Flashes Real Form in Final Tilt.

SALEM, Ore., March 21.—(AP)—Corvallis high school basketball team tonight by decisively defeating Franklin high of Portland, 34 to 20. Franklin took second place in the state tournament, Bellfountain, state "B" league champion, won third place by defeating Milton-Freswater, 29 to 17. Milton-Freswater took sixth place.

Corvallis led, 8 to 5, at the end of a nip-and-tuck first quarter and boosted the lead to 17 to 5 before the Portlanders could get going. Franklin held a slight edge the rest of the period but trailed 22 to 11 at mid-game.

The smooth breaking attack of "Mush" Torson's giants from the college city proved baffling to the tall Portlanders, and the power behind the plays entertained an estimated 2000 fans to frenzied pitch. The operation of the Corvallis quint proved the type rarely seen on a high school floor, tournament officials declared tonight.

Corvallis defeated a brilliant team and played consistently throughout the tournament. After an early quarter margin Corvallis commanded the lead throughout and in the final period played its additional three men for the experience.

The work of Warren, all-state center, proved outstanding while the forwards, Pfugrad and Blackledge, who were not named, excelled in their department for Corvallis.

Bellfountain went to work right from the start in its game with Milton-Freswater but found plenty of competition. The winners led, 14 to 8, at half time. Wallace, Bellfountain guard, proved the spark-plug, aided materially by Kessler, center. Wallace accounted for 11 points and Kessler eight. Kolbert, Milton-Freswater substitute guard, garnered four points, and was the only member of the losing team to count for more than one field goal.

Astoria, defending champions, staged a brilliant last period rally to win from the Tillamook Cheesemakers in a consolation game, 43 to 36. Astoria won fourth place and relegated the Cheesemakers to seventh. Ted Sarpola, again named all-star forward, piled up 18 points for the Fishermen. Astoria started strong, leading 13 to 4 at the first quarter, but were ahead but two points—17 to 15—at half time.

## M'PHERSON WINS A.A.U. HONORS BY LAST HALF RALLY

DENVER, Colo., March 21.—(UP)—Staging a great second half comeback after trailing throughout the first period, the powerful Globe Refiners of McPherson, Kansas, tonight defeated Universal Pictures of Hollywood, 47 to 35, to win the national A. A. U. basketball championship.

Trailing at 20-15 at the half, the Refiners turned on the heat after the intermission, and with their famous "fire department" style working to perfection, repeatedly broke under the Universal basket for cinch shots.

With Fortenberry, all-America center for the Refiners, Johnson, their all-America forward, and the veteran Tex Gibbons, playing his ninth national tournament, all hitting in top form, the Refiners seemed unbeatable as they surged up and down the floor, stealing the Universal passes and repeatedly breaking into the clear for set-ups.

Frank Lubin, Universal center, committed three personal fouls within the first 12 minutes of the game, and thereafter was ineffective in guarding Fortenberry, since he obviously feared a fourth foul which would send him from the game. He finally fouled out with three minutes remaining in the game.

## BURGER'S SQUAD HANDED LACING

POCATELLO, Idaho, March 21.—Pocatello high school's Indiana, battling neck and neck down the stretch in their third thrilling game of the state high school basketball tournament, stopped a determined and dangerous Blackfoot rally late in the final period and won the Idaho championship here tonight, 22-18.

In a preliminary game, the Twin Falls Bruins easily beat the Boise Braves 41-14 for the consolation title. Pocatello started to work against Blackfoot in almost perfect form and poured in seven of its first nine tries from the field.

The first period ended with the score 11-4 for Pocatello, and the Indians nept up the barrage under the half-ended, 19-10, in their favor. Blackfoot came back strong in the third quarter, scoring three field goals to boost their tally to 16 and keeping Pocatello scoreless in the period. Another field goal left the Broncos only one point behind, but Hadley tanked one for the Indians and Isham added a foul toss just before the final gun.

Twin Falls sailed through the Boise five, leading 14-3 at the first quarter, 23-26 at the half and 30-9 at the third period. The Bruins played flawlessly and broke through Boise to score at will, Andrews and Tutger leading in scoring with 11 apiece for the winners.

## HIGH HONORS OF TOURNAMENT FOR SARPOLA, ASTORIA

Named All State Forward for Third Straight Year—Corvallis and Franklin Aces Listed.

SALEM, March 21.—(AP)—Ted Sarpola, Astoria forward's performance in his last game of the tournament Saturday, scored for him the highest vote for first team forward and placed him on the all-state basketball team for the third consecutive year.

Corvallis placed Stewart Warren, center, and Merle Krueger, guard, on the all-state championship, while Franklin High School of Portland placed the other two, Tommy Hansen at forward and Jack Kemnitzner at guard.

Sarpola's record at forward for the former state champion, lists him as only the second high school player to be named all-state star three successive years. Glen Sanford of Salem received that honor in 1930-31-32. The second team selection was spread over five teams, Tillamook, Benton, Corvallis, Astoria and MacLaughlin high schools. Wood Moore, Tillamook and Frank Marchi, Benton high of Portland, were named forwards; Henry Kokko, Astoria, center; Elmo Crockett of Corvallis and Stanley Plak of MacLaughlin, guards.

For the first time in tournament history the coaches, officials and newspapermen who named the all-star team selected the state B team. Bellfountain high school in Benton county had three on that squad, with Mill City of Marion county, and Myrtle Creek of Douglas county, each one.

## SHIKAT VICTORY OVER O'MAHONEY STIRS GRAPPLERS

NEW YORK, March 21.—(AP)—Thrown badly off stride by what now appears to have been an entirely unscheduled "shooting match," mogul of the wrestling industry has adopted a policy of watchful waiting before moving to retain their most cherished possession—the heavyweight championship.

Not since Joe Savoldi took away the title from Jim London, the streamlined Greek, in Chicago, has the industry been so pathetically upset. The "villain" of the piece, of course, is Dick Shikat, who made Danho O'Mahoney well "Uncle" here a couple of weeks ago, took away a ring of the crown, and fled the eastern scene to take shelter under the wing of Al Haft, Columbus, O., promoter, who does a wholesale business in wrestlers.

The situation is not entirely clear but the consensus among grunting and groaning experts is that Shikat, tired of being "door-mat," decided to put on a scenario of his own, neglecting, meantime, to inform the proper authorities. In fact, he was quoted after the O'Mahoney bout as saying: "I hated to do it to Danho. He's a nice boy. I really felt sorry for him. But they (the "trust") had been pushing me around long enough."

There have been suggestions that with Shikat enrolled in Haft's troupe, the title may be expected shortly to pass into the hands of Everett Marshall, the La Junta, Colo., grappler, whose claims to the championship heretofore have fallen on deaf ears.

## BELCASTRO BACK ON ARMORY CARD; WILL MEET MACK

Pete Belcastro, Pacific coast light heavyweight champion, who has been away from the local wars for several months, returns tomorrow night when he meets Norman Mack, colorful and versatile Oklahoman on the main event card at the Armory.

Toughened by a hard series of bouts in southern California, Belcastro claims to be in the best condition of his career, and has promised to shoot everything tomorrow night.

Loaded with new holds he picked up while on his southern tour, the big Italian intends displaying them all. Always a popular favorite with local fans because of his constant action in the ring, he is favored to take Mack, regardless of that warrior's impressive record in the middle west and east.

On the middle main event Al Karasick, Russian Lion and ex-ballet dancer, will tangle with Prince Mihailias, of Bagdad, Arabia. The prince, grandson to Caliph Ibn Ali Hassan Mihailias, recently won the all-weight championship of Arabia, and is considered one of the best wrestlers in this country for his weight (190).

Advance reports on the Arabian state that he usually devotes his efforts to wrestling in the orthodox manner, but that he becomes highly outraged and dangerous when offended in the ring. In view of the rough treatment usually dished up by Karasick, it is considered highly probable that the prince will become "highly enraged."

Mihailias is a colorful character, sporting the use of western hats but sticking to the romantic looking jeweled turban to which he is entitled by Arabian birth.

On the opening card Dr. Barney Cosneck, doctor of philosophy from the University of Illinois, meets the biggest of the three newcomers to this week's card, when he clashes with Joe Marsh, powerful Missourian. Although said to be a clever wrestler when he wants to wrestle, Marsh is described as an exponent of the bite and slug school of wrestling thought. Advised that he is in for a rough evening, Cosneck admitted that he was not worried, but would treat any measure in their own coin, much as he treated Mike Caddock, bolserous ex-gob from Honolulu, last week. On that occasion it took Cosneck but a few minutes to dispose of the kicking and gouging Caddock.

Promoter Mack Lillard has described the card as one of the strongest he has ever presented here. There has been no rise in prices. The opening curtain will go up at 8:30.

## SOPH TRACKSTERS NOSE OUT 116-112 WIN O'ER SENIORS

A fighting Sophomore track squad battled for top honors in the high school interclass track meet Friday afternoon and edged out a threatening Senior aggregation 116 to 112. The Junior class representatives were hot on the tail of the upperclassmen, with 110, in one of the closest track meets registered on the coast this year.

The Juniors and Seniors took honors in the 100-yard dash, Kunzman taking the first heat in 11.2 for the four-year men, and Ettinger romping to the tape in the same time to take the second heat for the Juniors. Kunzman also took the 150-yard gallop, nosing out Linnell, running time 3:50. Linnell vindicated himself in the 350-yard dash, when he overhauled the flying Ettinger down the home stretch, Ettinger crossing the line second. Doty took first place in the 660 yard run for the Juniors, fighting down a desperate bid from Werner, sophomore, and Ettinger romping to the tape in a mile run for the Juniors, passing Stocks of the Senior squad on the home stretch.

Bowman, Sophomore star hurdler, made it a clean sweep in the obstacle races, taking both the low and high events. Goodman for the Seniors was second in the low events, and Horner took second in the highs, with the benefit of a six-foot start on the gun. Horner's performance for the entire afternoon was outstanding, he placing well up in the high jump, broad jump and obstacle runs.

Eldon Grow, Sophomore end on the last year football team, and basketball center and guard, surprised his teammates and the onlookers when he took the high jump with a leap of 5 feet 8 inches. Horner for the Sophomores, Curry for the Juniors and Doty, also, for the Juniors, placed high in the event.

The broad jump went officially to the Juniors when Ettinger cleared 18 feet, 6 1/2 inches, but Kunzman for the Seniors beat that distance by an inch and a half when he demanded his third try after that event had been declared over. The Senior win would not have made any shift in the outcome.

Barhart, Senior contestant in the shot-put and a dark horse in the event, took high honors with a toss of 40 feet, 7 inches. Kunzman was second, putting the 12 pound shot 39 feet, 6 inches.

The last event on the program, the discus throw, went to Erickson of the Seniors, with a cast of 83 feet, 3 inches. Santo of the Juniors was next with 77 feet, nine inches.

Cosch Bowerman declared himself satisfied with the meet as a whole, disappointed in certain performers and pleasantly surprised at the work of others.

On Wednesday of this week time trials will be run to determine the members who will invade Kerby for an interschool meet on Friday.

## STEELE ALL SET FOR RISKY BOUT

SEATTLE, Wash., March 21.—(AP)—Freddie Steele of Tacoma will get his big chance in the flistic business here Tuesday night when he meets Eddie (Babe) Riako of Syracuse, N. Y., world's middleweight champion, in a 10-round non-title fight in the civic auditorium.

By beating Riako, as he has 77 of the 84 opponents he has met since 1930, Steele can climb to the No. 1 challenging position for the crown. In his five years of professional battling, Steele has scored 98 knockouts, won 41 bouts by decision, fought five draws and lost two battles. He has knocked out 19 of his last 27 opponents.
