SAM BROWN WILL SEEK M'NARY JOB ON PENSION PLAN

SALEM, March 21.—(AP)—Sam H. Brown of Gervais, former state senator and a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor at the last primary election, announced today he would seek the Republican nomination for United States senator from Oregon.

Brown will oppose Senator Charles L. McNary. He said last night he had been virtually drafted for the race by the United Progressive society, with headquarters in Portland.

Brown announced he stood for "such pertinent issues of the day as the Townsend revolving pension plan; a sane and practical type of farm and home financing; for taking

the profit out of war; for preservation of natural resources, and for restoration of absolute currency control to the hands of the government."

PORTLAND, Ore., March 21.—(AP)—Senator Charles L. McNary (R., Ore.) mailed his declaration of candidacy for another term to the secretary of state at Salem today, the Journal's Washington correspondent said.

His only pledge was to "continue faithfully to render public service."

He asked that three words be printed after his name on the ballot. They were: "Candidate for re-election."

SPECIAL TIRES AID TO MOTORIST

Automobile tires should be "tailor-made" for the service to which they are to be used, according to Jack Anstey, budget manager of Lewis' Super Service Station, 8th and Front streets.

PORTLAND SMOKE ORDINANCE RUNS OUT BIG PAYROLL

PORTLAND, Ore., March 21.—(AP)—Portland faced the loss of the largest individual payroll in Oregon today.

Harry A. Green, president of the Doernbecher Furniture company, ordered the night shift of 450 men laid off and said the remainder of the 1,600 employees will be released gradually.

The announcement followed a verdict in municipal court holding the Doernbecher company guilty of violating Portland's smoke-density ordinance. Municipal Judge Donald E. Long did not levy a penalty.

Green said: "We don't want to be a nuisance to our neighbors, so we will move to another state." He declared the furniture business was too highly competitive to permit installation of a new power plant, and remarked "We have prided ourselves on keeping men working during the depression, but we cannot continue in the face of this ordinance." The Doernbecher plant was established here in 1900 when the company moved from Chehalis, Wash.

Walter W. Ray, mayor of the Portland chamber of commerce, said a special meeting of the chamber committee will be held today and commented, "We did everything we could. It is terrible this had to happen."

TATE'S RESORT AT M'LEOD SPEEDED

Improvements are progressing rapidly at Tate's Rogue River resort at McLeod in preparation for an active season.

The improvement program has been under way since March 1. A new store has been built, additional cabins have been constructed and the whole layout has been modernized, all facilities having been electrified wherever possible.

Formerly the McLeod auto camp, the property was acquired last fall by A. D. Tate, retired head of a Los Angeles printing company. It is Mr. Tate's aim to convert the place into a model, year-round fishing and hunting resort, with all necessary supplies and equipment available for the fisherman and the hunter.

The resort is 31 miles from Medford on Crater lake highway. It has a frontage of three-quarters of a mile on the highway, and a mile on the river, the grounds comprising 20 acres.

Romance of 50 Years Culminates at Altar

SPOKANE, Wash., March 21.—(AP)—A romance which had faded for half a century brought the marriage here today of George Langton, Minneapolis, and Mrs. Mary Arnold, Lewiston, Idaho. He is 75; she is 73.

\$5 FEE REBATE ON FARMER'S TRUCK

SALEM, March 21.—(AP)—Earl Snell, secretary of state, announced today rebates of \$5 will be made to all licensees of pick-up farm trucks, following the order today of Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan for a preemptory writ of mandamus fixing the license on that type of vehicle at \$5, instead of \$10.

The writ of mandamus is the collection of what was termed a "double fee" was filed by W. S. Bostman of Tillamook county. Snell said he would not appeal the case to the supreme court. He said he understood the order applied only to pick-up trucks used for farm purposes and not to other types.

The law had been declared unconstitutional by Judge L. H. McMahan of the Marion county circuit court.

FUTURE PROFITEER CLUB ORGANIZED

SALEM, March 21.—(AP)—A group of Salem citizens went a step further in their ridicule of the conduct of war with organization of a "National Association of Profiteers of Future Wars."

Members proposed to handle all supplies for the armed forces, the construction of cantonments and other wartime outlays, at a basis of cost plus 25 per cent. They propose to share five per cent of the profits with the men who do the fighting.

Rufus White, Mexican and World war veteran, was named president of Salem Chapter No. 1. Colonel William Aurd, Spanish-American and World war veteran, is vice-president.

KNOX LAW REPEAL AIM OF PETITION

SALEM, March 21.—(AP)—A preliminary initiative petition filed here yesterday provided for the repeal of the Knox liquor control act, and would replace it with a system of county and city regulation of the sale of intoxicating liquor.

The Home Rule League, Portland, represented by A. E. Kern, president, and R. O. Welch, secretary, sponsored the repeal measure.

The measure would grant towns and cities the right to license, regulate and control the sale of hard liquors. Tax revenues would be allocated on the basis of 25 per cent to the general fund of the state and 75 per cent to the common school fund.

FARMERS DEMAND MORE SOIL BONUS

WASHINGTON, March 21.—(AP)—Announcement of some details of the new farm program brought a quick response today in telegraphed protests against rates and conditions for paying soil conservation subsidies to producers of rice, sugar cane and sugar beets.

The protesting farmers were understood to be contending that they would not receive sufficient reimbursement under the payment plan outlined yesterday by Secretary Wallace.

Agricultural extension directors arrived from several states to confer with the AAA's two main problems were reported bringing knitted brows in conferences of officials responsible for administration of the new farm relief program.
