

'Klondike Annie', Latest Mae West Picture, on Craterian Program Today

VICTOR M'LAGLEN HAS LEADING ROLE WITH BLONDE STAR

Bringing Mae West back to the type of role which first won her fame on the screen in "She Done Him Wrong," her new picture, "Klondike Annie," opens a three day run at the Craterian theater today. "Ah, Wilderness," Coming to Craterian Thursday



Teaming two of the greatest figures on the screen today in a story that is literally the great American drama and a cross-section of average life in this nation, "Ah, Wilderness," Eugene O'Neill's great drama of family life, adolescent love, and the march of the years, comes Thursday to the Craterian theater.

Wallace Beery stars as Uncle Sid, the lovable, ineffectual inebriate, one of O'Neill's most human characters, with Lionel Barrymore as the father, Nat Miller, the role played

on the stage respectively by George M. Cohan and the late Will Rogers. The cast, hand-picked, is as unusual as the gripping story itself. The two high school lovers are played by Eric Linden and Cecelia Parker. The story deals with an American family in a small New England town in 1906. Barrymore plays the father. His son, graduating from high school, and in the throes of his first love affair, goes through the transports and despair that each boy lives through, and there is a parallel in the romance of middle life between Beery, the shiftless reporter, and Aline MacMahon, the maiden aunt, whose love never ripened into marriage because of the inefficiency of her lover and his taste for drink.

MILWAUKIE JAILS COLUMNIST BROWN

MILWAUKIE, Wis., March 21.—(UP)—Haywood Brown, columnist and president of the American Newspaper Guild, and five others were put into jail today after a scuffle with police in front of the Wisconsin News, where editorial workers have been on strike five weeks.

Brown was charged with disorderly conduct and resisting an officer. Two strikers and three sympathizers were arrested on the first charge.

After guild and labor union members had raised \$245 to bail out five of those arrested, Brown fished in his baggy trousers and produced \$125 bond for his own release. He refused to leave jail until the others were released.

HOUSE DEMOCRATS FIGHT PRESIDENT CCC CLOSING PLAN

WASHINGTON, March 21.—(AP)—A move to force a house caucus of House Democrats in an effort to block President Roosevelt's plan for closing hundreds of CCC camps April 1 was held up suddenly today "pending further developments."

Chairman Nichols (D., Okla.) of the bloc revolting against the president's order withdrew a caucus petition signed by 34 representatives.

"The responsibility for this step is all mine," Nichols said. "I decided to hold it up pending further developments that may enable us to obtain our objective of keeping the present number of CCC camps without calling a caucus."

Under the petition Chairman Taylor (D., Colo.) of the caucus would have been compelled to order the meeting Tuesday.

Nichols indicated a special committee would go ahead drafting legislation to authorize an appropriation to continue the camps another year.

MISSSES BOYS AND LANDS IN DITCH

Trevor B. Hare of Central Point missed the two kids on bicycles, but landed in a pretty kettle of fish himself, he told city police yesterday. Driving south toward this city Hare had just reached the turn near where Court street intersects the Pacific highway at the north city limits, when two boys on bicycles rode in front of him, Hare told police.

Swinging hard in an effort to miss the two boys, he shot across the highway to the left, narrowly missed a concrete irrigation ditch pylon, took off over the edge of the ditch and landed smack in about a foot of water at the bottom of the canal.

The drop was one of about eight feet, and the impact broke two of the wheels, sheer away from the spokes, and scattered mud in a wide arc. Hare was not hurt. A runaway of planks and a truck hitched in front aided in retrieving the sea-going auto after new wheels had been attached. Twelve kids on bicycles watched the rescue proceedings.
