

### COLLEGES OFFER SCHOLARSHIP AID FOR MEN OF CCC

Members of the Medford CCC district who receive the highest ratings in their scholastic work and camp life will be rewarded with valuable scholarships made available by college and trade schools on the coast, headquarters announced today.

The scholarships to be awarded total many hundreds of dollars in value. Members will be selected through the rating system now in use throughout the district. Company commanders, project superintendents and educational advisers work in camp, on the job and in the educational program, the announcement pointed out.

Although not all of the members taking part are high school graduates, those ineligible for college entrance will be able to win scholarships to trade and business schools.

Following are the liberal arts scholarships offered by universities and colleges to the men of the Medford district:

Linfield college, McMinnville: One full tuition scholarship and several half-tuition scholarships. One year tuition amounts to \$75.  
Polytechnic Junior College, Oakland, Calif.: One full tuition scholarship, renewable for the second year upon recommendation of faculty. One year tuition amounts to \$150.

Oregon State college, Corvallis, University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon Normal school, Monmouth, and Southern Oregon Normal school, Ashland: Open competition with other students for 125 state scholarships. One year tuition amounts to \$54 for resident students and \$174 for non-resident students.

Albany college, Albany: One-half tuition scholarships for the total number of camps in the district. Also work at college dormitory guaranteed to cover 40 per cent of board bill for all who receive scholarships. One half-year tuition amounts to \$65.

Following are the engineering and trade school scholarships offered:  
L. I. Adcox Trade school of automotive, Diesel and aviation courses, Portland: Three full tuition scholarships. One year tuition amounts to \$395.

Head Engineering college, San Francisco, Calif.: One full college degree course in engineering tuition scholarship, covering 24 months. Two year tuition amounts to \$500.

Head Engineering college, San Francisco, Calif.: One full shorter engineering diploma course tuition scholarship covering one year. One year tuition amounts to \$150 to \$300.  
Polytechnic College of Engineering, Oakland, Calif.: One full tuition scholarship, renewable for the second and third years upon recommendation of the faculty. One year tuition amounts to \$250.  
Following are the business colleges offering scholarships:  
Head Business college, Oakland, Calif.: One full college degree course in commerce tuition scholarship covering two years. Two-year tuition amounts to \$425.  
Head Business college, Oakland, Calif.: One full commercial diploma course tuition scholarship covering 15 months. Fifteen months tuition amounts to \$125 to \$265.

nectlet river, which inundated large portions of the city, should return to its own channel.

Troops aided Red Cross and WPA workers in caring for 8000 refugees. Other forces set to work to begin repairing damage estimated at \$25,000,000.

Refugees and relief workers in Hartford and elsewhere were inoculated against typhoid.

About 20 persons were reported as missing—there has been only one known death—but Hartford officials were confident most of them would be located at relief agencies or at homes of friends.

The 23-year old defendant signed a confession while serving a sentence in the Oregon penitentiary on a burglary charge, police alleged.

In the purported confession he was alleged to have implicated Ralph I. Tremaine, who is still at large. Caples was slain when he resisted

robbers in the back yard of his home. Despite the asserted confession, Stringer pleaded innocent.

dress: "I am particularly happy to be here today for it is the first time I have had the privilege of seeing my better half in cap and gown.

Gains Life Ambition  
"Also, a life long ambition of mine is achieved, at last my literary qualities are recognized. It cannot be because I have published books. I am sure—and I know my friends of the press are going to squirm at this—it must be because in the olden days I was editor-in-chief of my college paper."

Immediately after the exercises the president departed by motor on an hour's ride to Titusville where he entrained again for Port Lauderdale. Late this afternoon in that vicinity he was to set out to sea for a long-planned fishing cruise.

Before leaving here the president scanned latest reports on the flood relief work.

Edward Conrad, president of Florida State college for women, presented the Algernon Sydney Sullivan medalion to Mrs. Roosevelt.

The award to Mrs. Roosevelt said: "For the attainment of the finer elements of character, sincerity, helpfulness, purity of motive, exalted ideals of service and the steadfast pursuit of the noblest purposes of life."  
Hamilton Holt, president of Rollins presented.

Roosevelt Lauded  
In recommending the honorary degree of doctor of literature for the president, John J. Tigert, president of the University of Florida, said:

"Mr. Roosevelt assumed the presidency in one of the blackest hours in the history of the republic. It was a moment when the slightest misstep, the most trivial misstatement, the faintest suspicion of indecision might have precipitated a panic, if not a revolution. It was a time for leadership, for courage, for sublime faith. He exhibited all three.  
"From that fateful day to this he has given his all to lead his country through the valley of the shadow, out and up towards those higher and happier levels where hope and confidence abide. The heroism, the pathos, the loneliness of this honest and straight-forward endeavor to face the needs and perils of the day—the keeping of his head when all about him were losing theirs—these are reasons why we representatives of Florida's seven institutions of higher learning unite this morning to honor the man who has been called the most conspicuous, exciting and interesting individual now in the world."

### PRESENT NUMBER OF CCC CAMPS TO REMAIN FOR YEAR

WASHINGTON, March 23.—(AP)—Representative Nichols (D-Okla.) informed the house today that the present number of civilian conservation camps would be maintained until March 31, 1937.

Nichols, leader of the bloc which protested proposed curtailment of the camps, read a presidential order addressed to Robert F. Peckner, the CCC director. It stipulated that the number of camps be maintained except as affected by completion of work or absorption of enrollees in private employment.

The communication indicated the number kept in camps would be approximately 350,000.

It said \$8,825,000 would be made available as needed from 1935 relief funds for meeting expenses for the next year would be provided later.

Asserting the objectives of his group had been realized, Nichols said there would be no further move for a democratic caucus on the matter.

### TOWNSENDITES FAIL TO MEET

Conflicting reports were given today for the failure of plans to reorganize Townsend Club No. 2 of Medford, which disbanded by popular vote last week to allegedly avoid alliance, either actual or implied, with radical members within their ranks.

Several members of the old club called a meeting, to have been held in the Guild hall on North Oakdale Friday night, for the purpose of reorganizing the club along new lines. The meeting was called by G. I. Maxwell, but was not held. It was reported that only about six persons appeared for the meeting.

Maxwell could not be contacted today, and Harold Brown, in charge of the hall, was out of the city.

### POLITICIANS EYE BORAH'S BACKING FROM TOWNSEND

WASHINGTON, March 23.—(AP)—The capital tried today to gauge the effect the endorsement of Dr. F. R. Townsend, old age pension leader, would have on the Borah presidential drive.

Dr. Townsend announced his support of Senator Borah (R., Idaho) on the ground that "he has moved a great deal further towards our ideals than any other candidate in sight in either party."

In a new onslaught on the new deal, Republican National Chairman Henry P. Fletcher asserted in a statement that "The Roosevelt regime has merely deepened the depression."  
Democratic leaders, mapping the campaign to come, withheld their fire.

Borah, on the husting in Chicago over the week-end, listed old age pensions as a part of his platform. But he has said flatly that he does not believe the Townsend plan of \$200 a month payments to the aged is practical.
