SPRING REGISTRY AT SONS EXCEEDS RECENT RECORDS

ASHLAND, March 24.—(Sp.)—The largest spring registration in several years was indicated at Southern Oregon Normal school Monday as students were enrolling for another three months of study following the completion of winter term last week.

A total of 283 students studied here last spring term, and the figure of 280 was reached by registration officials at an early hour Monday.

The winter term figure of 356 was the largest for that quarter since the two-year period of 1927-28, when 380 and 400 students, respectively, were enrolled. Spring term enrollment may set a similar record before the last registration day on April 4.

The average spring term enrollment for the nine years of the school's existence has been 269.33, apportioned as follows:
