In the next few days, Hauptmann has been sentenced to die in the electric chair Tuesday night.

Attorney General Wilentz had little to say on the examinations made in the house.

"The prosecution staff," he said, "felt they had no part in today's investigation, but had a fear because of the improper questioning of at least one of the state police officers by a person or agency without authority and unknown to us."

One of the governor's own investigators, who was present during the

examination of the Hauptmann attic, was Leon Hogue, a New York private detective.

Hogue, it was learned, had questioned Detective Louis Bronnman, of the New Jersey state police, at length in the Wilburth barracks of the state police near Trenton a few days ago. Bronnman was the detective who worked with Arthur Koehler, federal wood expert, who testified that one rail of the kidnap ladder—rail 16—had been cut from a floorboard in the Hauptmann attic, and that the nail holes in the rail matched those in the attic joists.

As the governor left he said he had no plans to question Dr. John P. (Japsie) Condon, the Lindbergh ransom negotiator, today.

opening the files of telegraph company offices to the investigators. Yet when the commission's reply was filed in answer to a senate resolution, and stated that it was making an investigation on its own responsibility, Minton continued, "nothing was said about it."

Personal Ethics Touched.

Minton contended the commission and Black committee investigators acted under their respective authority and without prior agreement in searching the telegraph companies' records.

Minton told the senate Hearst "wouldn't know the Goddess of Liberty if she came down off her pedestal in New York harbor and bowed to him."

"He would probably try to get her telephone number," he continued, adding that the publisher "wouldn't know the meaning of freedom of the press if the constitution were spread out before him."

"He has a peculiar code of ethics for himself," Minton said. "He runs his newspapers on the same high plane he conducts his private life."

At this point Senator Copeland (D., N. Y.) voiced an objection to an "attack on a citizen of my state," but Minton rejoined:

"I have nothing to take back."

40 & 8 CONTINUES IMMUNIZATION AID FOR RURAL YOUNG

Southern Oregon Vulture, 40 et 8, fun order of the American Legion, will continue efforts for immunization of rural children from diphtheria. It was announced today. The work was begun in 1925 by all Vultures of the country as part of the organization's child welfare program.

According to today's announcement: "Much has been accomplished, but there remain thousands of children who have not yet had advantage of immunization. Recent past history proves that this disease can be eradicated as has been smallpox and typhoid fever."

"National reports for the year 1935 show 155,000 cases with 16,000 deaths. In 1930 this was reduced to 65,000 cases with 5,962 deaths. Data for the first eight months of 1935 show 4,500 fewer cases than a similar period in 1934, while the year 1934 showed 775 fewer deaths than in 1933.

"The plan adopted by the 40 et 8 is simplicity itself and depends upon cooperation of all concerned. Education of the parents has been and still is the first step. Cooperation of state and county health departments (which has been of the heartiest), the second step; cooperation of local doctors in administration of the serum; the third step; and supplying of the serum by the 40 et 8 the final step.

"In 1935 the Grand Vulture of Oregon immunized 5,394 children within the state and Southern Oregon Vulture 640 in Jackson and Josephine counties alone; 1936 will show an even larger number of immunizations.
