## PETE FACES PECK IN MAIN GRAPPLE MONDAY EVENING

Pete Belcastro, Pacific coast junior heavyweight wrestling champion, will meet Frankie Peck, globe-hiking San Franciscan and exponent of the skull cracking headlock, on the main event at the Armory next Monday night. Promoter Mack Lillard announced today.

Peck, who watched Belcastro wrestle in Hollywood several weeks ago, has demanded that the champion put up his championship belt for the tussle, but this Belcastro has refused to do, saying that enough money would be the only consideration under which he would risk the title.

Both men are well liked in this city. Belcastro employs a vastly differing ring style, constantly boring into an opponent and attempting one hold after another until he finds one which hurts his enemy. Peck, on the other hand, is the rugged type who prefers to let his opponent dish it out while waiting his own turn to get his favorite—the headlock. Peck is also partial to the hammerlock and arm bars, and occasionally uses jiu jitsu holds.

Norman Mack, who lost last Monday to Belcastro only after a terrific struggle, will watch tricks with Dr. Barney Cosneck, University of Illinois graduate and doctor of philosophy. Promoter Lillard, advised that many of the fans doubted that Mack is of the size he claims to be (185 pounds), offered to weigh the Oklahoman in public. Mack himself, resentful of the implication that he can't take care of himself in any company, has vowed that he will flatten Cosneck as a gesture of his own ability, in short order.

Prince Mihalkica, Arabian nobleman, who defeated Awful Al Karasick in their bout this week, will meet big Joe Marsh in the curtain raiser. The prince asked that the public be assured that his camel lock, with which he almost permanently disabled Karasick, is not his only punishing hold, and promised that he would unveil several just as impressive against Marsh. Marsh himself, who exhibits a strange uninterestedness in his wrestling while applying a bone bending hold, had nothing to say of his chances of eliminating Mihalkica.

The opener and the middle bout will be under the Australian round system, with the Belcastro-Peck affair under the American system of two out of three falls.

## 25 TRACK STARS GOING TO KERBY MEETING FRIDAY

Twenty-five Medford high school track stars will leave by auto Friday morning for Kerby, where they will tangle with the high school there in the first interscholastic meet for Medford in years. Trials were held here yesterday to select the traveling squad, but Coach Bowerman stated that the results will apply only to this meet, with every student in school still eligible to try out for the team.
