him a means of shooting his way to freedom. She has been treated for a week here. She justified the practically hopeless odds with the defiant assertion, "well, there was at least a chance to die with him."

Hall became resigned to his fate late yesterday when informed Governor Merriam had denied the oral application of his attorney for a reprieve founded on the ground he was needed as a witness at his wife's trial.

He spent his last day writing letters, one of them to his wife. She received it in the Sacramento jail, broke down and cried hysterically. Later she fell into a deep sleep and apparently slept soundly until 9:30 this morning.

Hall spent a sleepless night. Nervous and high strung he paced his cell and only a few times stretched out on his bunk. He ate a light breakfast.

Although seemingly on the point of breaking, he walked to the scaffold unassisted. He declined to make any statement. The sacrament was administered by Father Cronin of the prison's Catholic chapel.

No claims have been received for his body. Barnett Huse, secretary to Warden Smith, stated, and as a result he probably will be buried in the prison yard.

Hall shot down Highway Patrolman Steven M. Kent and Kent's brother-in-law, Lester Quigley, March 10, 1933, when the man recognized Hall as the fugitive hunted for kidnaping a federal customs officer at the Canadian border a week before.

After his car had been forced to the curb, Hall fired three times at the approaching pair. Kent died instantly, a bullet through his heart. Quigley was dead 15 minutes later, two bullets in his chest.
