

# Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers in Newest Hit on Craterian Screen Today

BRILLIANT DANCE TEAM IN MUSICAL COMEDY FILM HIT

Their fourth co-starring musical hit brings Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers to the screen of the Craterian theatre, starting today, in "Follow the Fleet." And, as was the case in their last show "Top Hat," the entire musical score was written by the ace songwriter, Irving Berlin. His genius floods the screen to provide rhythm for the miraculous feet of Astaire and Rogers, and infectious lyrics for their voices.

"Follow the Fleet" is an adaptation of two famous plays, "Hit the Deck" and "Shore Leave." It is a story of gobs and girls when the fleet's in. It catches the invigorating spirit of the navy afloat and ashore, dramatizing its high-pitched excitement and gaiety, its robust humor, its romantic depths and setting the whole dizzy whirl to effervescent music.

Astaire and Miss Rogers, either singly or together, sing and dance five numbers. Two other numbers introduce Harriet Hilliard, recruited from radio and stage, to motion picture fans in a manner that almost steals the show. Randolph Scott, seen in "Roberta," with the two dancing stars, is again featured with them—this time as Astaire's buddy. Others in the cast include Astrid Allwyn, Ray Mayer, Betty Grable, Joy Hodges and Jeanne Grey.

The Craterian's Wednesday only show brings little Jane Withers, with Pinky Tomlin, Rita Candino, Jane Darwell and George Divot—the Greek ambassador of radio—in "Paddy O'Day."

"Paddy O'Day" is a little Irish lass who comes to the United States in the steerage of a boat, only to learn her mother has died and she must be sent back by the immigration officers. But Paddy, little miss that she is, decides to stay and, eluding the officers, makes her way to the house where her mother used to work. There she finds two eccentric aunts trying to suppress the irrepressible Pinky Tomlin. Pinky and Paddy, kindred souls, enjoy themselves together until the law comes and almost succeeds in sending Paddy back to Ireland—almost.

### CHAMBER BOARD PLANS ELECTION AT FINAL MEET

The last luncheon-meeting of the present board of directors of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce was held this noon in the Hotel Med-

ford, with Ben E. Harder, president, in charge. The next meeting will be held on April 17, after the annual election has been completed.

Mr. Harder thanked his colleagues and directors for their loyal support and cooperation during the past year.

In compliance with a request from the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association, the board voted to urge congressmen from Oregon to give their support to a pending bill providing federal funds for roads and highways.

Plans were made for the annual election and a committee was appointed by Mr. Harder to serve as a ballot board. The committee comprises Max Peirce, Capt. S. M. Tuttle

and R. K. Norris.

Primary ballots are to be sent out to members on April 1. Fourteen directors are to be nominated of whom seven are to be elected in the final ballot to be distributed on April 9. The ballot committee is to count the votes and announce the outcome on April 15.

Seven new directors are to be named by rural organizations, one each by the Central Point city council, the Gold Hill Chamber of Commerce, the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce, the Talent Chamber of Commerce, the Dairyman's association, the Eagle Point Grange and the Prospect district.

Seven members of the present board of directors will continue in office, their terms not expiring until next year.

The new board of 21 members will hold an organizational meeting on April 17, at which officers will be elected and committees appointed.

The annual general meeting of the chamber will be held about April 24.
