HEALTH OFFICIALS NEGLECTED CHILD SAYS GRAND JURY

SALEM, April 1.—(AP)—The Marion county grand jury, through a special report to Judge L. H. McMahon, criticized the procedure of the county health unit in handling a severe case of illness which resulted in the death of an eight-year-old child near Salem.

The report cited evidence of alleged "neglect" on the part of "the people with authority to act," and criticized the existing health system in the county generally.

The grand jurors reported that a middle-aged widow, living on a county pension of \$10 a month and supporting a child, had appealed to the health unit twice before a nurse came. A doctor was not sent until the following day, the report cited.

He brought no thermometer, left no medicine and prescribed no treatment. The following day a private physician was summoned by the widow. He pronounced the child gravely ill in 24 hours the child died, the jurors reported.

"While we know in this particular case that there was no criminal intent on the part of any one, nevertheless there is every evidence of real neglect on the part of the people with authority to act," the jurors reported.

The jury said it took seven telephone calls to get the child admitted to a hospital when physician's examination showed her to be gravely ill. The report mentioned no names.

BIG ROAD JOBS LET THIS MONTH

SALEM, April 1.—(AP)—Estimated costs of highway projects for which bids will be opened by the state highway commission April 16 and 17, set at \$1,800,000, represents the highest figure of any awards during the past 12 years with the exception of the coast bridge, the state highway department announced today.

Twenty-four projects will be offered to contractors during the two-day session but the commission today announced only the lettings for April 16. The remaining 10 will be announced later.

The largest project to be awarded will be the railroad over-riding on Union avenue in Portland, estimated at about \$350,000. This is part of the extension program of the Oregon City-Portland super highway.

The announced projects include work in Douglas, Umatilla and Multnomah counties.

Baer Case Waits Ruling On Appeal PORTLAND, April 1.—(AP)—The case of Walter Baer, German ex-convict facing deportation, awaits the outcome of an appeal to the federal circuit court of appeals. H. M. Easterly, lawyer associated in the Baer defense, said today.

The New York district court recently dismissed a writ of habeas corpus and upon this decision an appeal was made to the circuit court. Easterly said it was possible that the case may not be ruled upon before next fall.

Brown Nettled By Radio Speech Ban SALEM, April 1.—(AP)—Sam Brown, Republican candidate for the nomination to the United States senate, today said he was at a loss to understand why a Portland radio station (KOIN) had cancelled his time on the air tonight for a "frank discussion of the political endorsements of the Oregon Townsend club."

"The time had been granted by the station," Brown said, "and the payments made. Last night the permit was cancelled."

WOMAN REVEALS MURDER CAUSES

BURNS, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—A rangeland feud over horses, followed by jealousy over Mrs. Mable Clark, led to the slaying of Ed McDonald, Mrs. Clark testified at the trial of Tib Skeins, accused murderer.

C. L. Jamison and Eldon Madden, possemen who captured Skeins at the Rihart ranch in the Oryzhee breaks of eastern Oregon, testified that Skeins claimed McDonald was a member of the old Oklahoma Jennings mail robber gang and intended to return when he raised enough money to fight the case.

The only eye witness, Mrs. Clark, said Skeins was intoxicated the night of the shooting. He and McDonald previously had trouble over horses, she said, and Skeins vowed revenge.

Mrs. Clark, McDonald and others dined at a cafe. After McDonald left Skeins made advances, but was refused and displayed jealousy, the witness said.

Shortly afterward Skeins shot McDonald and then fled to the badlands on horseback, Mrs. Clark concluded.

CAMPUS PROWLER GETS GOOD HAUL FROM O.S.C. FRATS

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—A campus prowler stole \$350 worth of watches and \$98 in cash from four fraternity houses at Oregon State college early today and escaped by slugging Robert A. Lee, student from Glendale, Cal.

The thief was believed the same one who burglarized several University of Oregon fraternities last week.

Lee said he was asleep in his study room when he was awakened and noticed the intruder about 4:30 o'clock. He grabbed a heavy flashlight, followed the thief and ordered him out of his car.

Lee broke the flashlight over the burglar's head, but was dazed by a blow in return, suffering a gash which required several stitches, but was able to go to classes.

Police obtained a good description of the man who they said was about 21 years of age and traveling in a (Dodge or Plymouth) coupe.

Two years ago a pair of fraternity robbers were captured and sent to the state penitentiary.

The houses burglarized were Sigma Nu, Delta Upsilon and Phi Gamma Delta, where Lee was living.
