

GAY SOCIAL NIGHT PUT ON PROGRAM BY YOUNG DEMOS

Plans for a dance with gala features were approved by the Young Democratic club of Jackson county at a meeting in West Main street headquarters last night as a means of adding spice to its regular program of party business.

It was decided to hold the dance the latter part of this month in Knights of Pythias hall, the program committee to determine the exact date so as to avoid conflict with other social events. It was voted to have a series of cocktail parties prior to the dance and to entertain the ball itself with a number of gay side features.

DUAL FINGERPRINT CASE DISCOVERED

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 3.—(UP)—Because the fingerprints of William Schmidt, Walla Walla, so resembled those of an escaped convict that he was transported across a state line back to prison before the error was discovered, city police today were deluged with requests from peace officers of several states asking for detailed information.

The possibility of identical fingerprints—with its connotations of false arrest, libel and damage to criminal evidence—had apparently worried many law enforcement authorities.

Schmidt was arrested here recently on a minor charge and fingerprinted. His prints were apparently those of Harley Felt, wanted for escape from Idaho State prison in Boise. Not until he was taken to Boise was the case of mistaken identity revealed.

California state prison officials, in writing Walla Walla police for complete sets of prints and all information, remarked that such a case—of authentic—might be used in the future by lawyers to break down the generally accepted infallibility of fingerprint identification. A Reno bio-

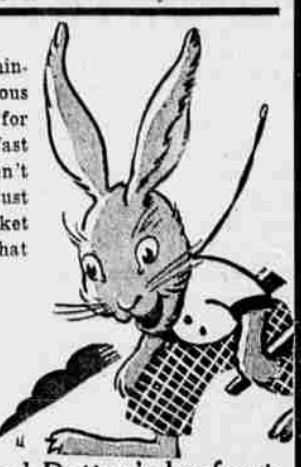
