**Service Women Survey**  
The Past Presidents' Parley of the American Legion auxiliary (an organization of past department presidents) has as an integral part of its program, the formation of a roster of women who served in the active military and naval forces of the U. S. during the Great War. These women served as army nurses, yeomanettes, navy nurses and marinettes and received honorable discharge. This assignment was given to the parley because the well-being of the women veterans of the World War is its special objective. No such roster has been made since these women enlisted, and one is desired, not only for historical purposes, but to assist the parley in its service program.

The aid of each unit of the American Legion auxiliary is asked in the making of this survey. In making this survey the auxiliary is cooperating with the Women's Overseas League in its survey, which is being made at this time, by listing the women who served overseas, but who are not veterans. This includes army nurses, Red Cross nurses, Salvation Army and Y. W. C. A. workers. This list will be sent to the Women's Overseas League.
