A Townsend club at Roseburg refused recently to make similar contributions. Roy Compton, leader of the Roseburg revolt, pointed out the large number of state area board members who are candidates for political offices. He said his club still was loyal to the Townsend plan, however.
Paine, who inaugurated the statewide canvass, said: "If we can be assured of one-third of the state voting strength, we will have nothing to worry about." The campaign should bring Oregon's estimated 130,000 Townsend club members to 200,000 and result in establishment of 130 new clubs, he said.
