The battle will bring together two of the cleverest matmen ever to appear in Medford. Both are fast and deceptive, and Mihalakis' performance last Monday in moving down the versatile Dr. Barney Cosneck won him a main event against the big champion. Promoter Mack Lillard said in announcing the fracas.

Mihalakis has won all of his three matches here, downing Al Karasiek, Joe March and Cosneck. He has been anxious to meet Belcastro, and the champion has gone into strict training in Klamath Falls to prepare for what he realizes will be a bitter struggle, Lillard said.

Pete Belcastro, now Pacific coast junior heavyweight champion in wrestling used to be a boxer. **Grant and Budge Get Tennis Honor**

HOUSTON, Tex., April 8.—(AP)—Wilmer Allison, captain of the United States Davis Cup team for the matches against Mexico, today assigned Bryan M. Grant and Don Budge to play the singles matches after they had wrecked his title hopes in the River Oaks tennis tournament.

Grant won his second consecutive River Oaks championship yesterday by defeating the 1935 national champion, 6-1, 4-6, 6-4, 6-0. It was the first time in years that Allison had dropped the decisive set of a match without winning a game.
