

JONES RETURNING TO ROGUE RIVER FOR NEW START

Walter J. Jones, former Mayor of Rogue River, was freed from state prison yesterday, after serving 32 months of a four-year sentence for ballot theft. His term was shortened 16 months by good behavior.

Jones, who will return to his orchard-farm near Rogue River, told Salem interviewers he will "start all over again." His wife and son-in-law await his return. Jones is now 63 years old. Up to his entanglement with the agitation of Banks and Fehl, he was never in trouble, and bore a good reputation in the Rogue River district, and in Del Norte county, California, where he has many friends.

Press dispatches from Salem today stated that Governor Martin would make no immediate decision upon the protest against release of Earl H. Fehl, whose "good time" allowance, if any, entitle him to release next Wednesday.

Copies of a pamphlet, "Black Political Plot Exposed," of which Fehl admitted authorship, and, in which he viciously attacked Jackson county

courts and juries, and made sweeping allegations, along with a transcript of grand jury testimony have been filed with the governor and state parole board. Three persons were charged with criminal libel in the circulation of the pamphlet, and were granted suspended sentences, upon plea of guilty.

The release of Jones leaves but L. A. Banks, former local agitator, serving life for murder, and Fehl behind prison walls, of the half dozen men sent there for roles in the Jackson county turmoil.

HOYLMAN FACING SENTENCE FRIDAY

Raleigh Hoylman, adjudged an habitual criminal, by a circuit court jury's findings, with life imprisonment as a mandatory penalty, under the Oregon habitual criminal law, will be formally sentenced tomorrow, if the time of the court permits. Otherwise his sentence, and that of other defendants will be postponed until Monday, April 20.

The regular Josephine county term of the circuit starts next Monday and Judge Norton will be holding court in Grants Pass most of next week.

Hoylman, by documentary evidence, was shown to have been convicted four times and sentenced to state prison four times for felonies.

Boyd Hamilton, Applegate district resident, found guilty of larceny of live stock, "A 7-U steer," also awaits sentence. Hamilton, stoutly maintains his innocence, despite the adverse verdict.

PEAR PROMOTION PROGRAM WILL BE PRESENTED HERE

In order that fruitmen of the Rogue River valley may have a fair concept of the pear promotion advertising that is being carried on in the east by the Oregon Washington Pear bureau, a reproduction of a radio program on the subject will be given over station KMED three times next week.

The program chosen for presentation is a recorded program presented over the Yankee network, with headquarters in Boston, which had an estimated audience of 3,500,000. Gretchen McMullen, nationally known dietitian and food expert, made the broadcast, and recording instruments picked it up directly off the air, according to Raymond Reter of the Pinnacle Packing company here, an officer of the Oregon-Washington Pear bureau.

The recording was presented before the directors of the bureau at a recent meeting in Portland, and Reter considered it so good he secured it for local presentation.

The recording is said to be a fair example of the advertising work being carried on in the press and over the air. Professor Henry Hartman, technical advisor for the bureau, has stated that the advertising has produced remarkable results, and is directly responsible for the increase in sales of Boac and D'Anjou pears.

The campaign is being presented in not only Boston, but in New York city, Philadelphia, Omaha, New Orleans, Birmingham, Atlanta, and other cities of the east, mid-west and south, Reter said.

Other officials here of the Oregon-Washington Pear bureau include David Rosenberg of the Bear Creek orchards, D. R. Wood of the Palmer corporation, Shelby Tuttle of S. O. S. and Gordon Green of American Fruitgrowers.

The program will be presented over KMED for the first time Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock. On Tuesday it will be again presented at 12:30 p. m., in a noon broadcast, and on Wednesday evening from 7:15 to 7:30, it will again be on the air.

NON-SUPPORT TRIAL SET FOR EVERHARD

Henry Everhard, charged with non-support, on complaint of his wife, was scheduled to appear for trial today in justice court. A relief worker with four children, Everhard has been paroled "three or four times, for offenses," the district attorney said. His wife alleges he gives her but \$10 per month out of his \$44 per month salary, spending the balance on himself.

It was also alleged that Everhard, at the conclusion of his last stay in the county jail, walked off with the jail hair clippers. They have been returned to the district attorney's office.

James N. Williams of the Talent district, charged with operating an auto with improper lights, was yesterday fined \$1 and costs and given until May 1 to pay.

PRESBYTERIANS HEAR GLOWING REPORTS AT ANNUAL CONVOCATION

A large number was in attendance at the annual congregational meeting of the First Presbyterian church Tuesday evening. The Women's association was in charge of the covered dish dinner. Harvey Field sang several numbers, after which Rev. R. S. Peterson led the devotionals.

Reports of the various departments of the church were most encouraging. Dr. B. R. Elliott and C. I. Baker reported for the Sunday school that the enrollment showed a growth of 55 over last year and that the treasury showed a balance of \$30 after the supplies for the first quarter of the new church year had been paid.

The board of deacons reported a balance of \$26 in cash and some canned goods and articles still available for use. The giving of the church, Sunday school and missionary society benevolences totaled approximately \$400.

Arthur Clarke, reporting for the Young People's society, reviewed the various achievements of the year including a number of service projects and speaking of the fine spirit of co-operation and church loyalty of the young people's group.

Grater Lake guild reported an unusually successful year. The Women's Missionary society reported 10 per cent increase in gifts and a year of carefully planned missionary education with an average attendance of 30 at the meetings.

The music committee reported a splendid growing chorus choir and commended the choir leader, Miss Edna Birt, for her efforts. The committee on permanent pastor reported that it was not yet ready to recommend a candidate for permanent pastor, and that the relationship with Rev. Ralph S. Peterson as stated supply be continued until further action is recommended.

The report of Rev. R. S. Peterson expressed appreciation for the co-operation of the people in all activities of the church and showed a steady growth in the spiritual life and achievement of the church.

sped from his small service station near here, driving a coupe. Pulling near the school bus, he opened fire with 32 calibre and 35 calibre revolvers. Haynes ordered the children to flatten themselves on the floor of the machine, and tried to outdistance the pursuer.

Unable to do so, Haynes stopped his machine and ran back to Smith's car. When he attempted to yank the ignition keys from the coupe Smith threatened to slash his throat. Haynes was forced to retreat to the bus, in which he made a final dash to the school yard, where Smith was captured.

Smith said he thought it was Sunday, that he felt the children had no right to go to school on Sunday, and for that reason he tried to stop the bus.

IMMUNIZATION WORK ADVANCING RAPIDLY SAY 40 ET 8 HEADS

Immunization of children in rural districts from diphtheria and smallpox continues, the serum being furnished free to all county health units and administered by the county doctors and nurses, in Jackson county.

Officers of volunteer 40 & 8 (4th organization of the American Legion) declare the body has furnished the local health unit serum free for the following schools: Oak Grove, 27; Phoenix, 51; Talent, 30; Central Falls, 50; Eagle Point, 18; Gold Hill, 19; Rogue River, 35, and today Dr. A. N. Johnson and Miss Blanche Runnels, of the Jackson County Health unit, are taking care of the children at the Howard school.

This immunization is a major project of the 40 & 8 organization, the 40 & 8 volunteer comprising Jackson and Josephine counties has also furnished free serum for Josephine County Health unit. There has been nearly as many in Josephine county immunized as in Jackson to date, the total running near 700 for the two counties.

TWO-HEADED CALF IS SIX DAYS OLD

SAN DIEGO, Calif., April 9.—(AP)—A calf with two heads, blinking four eyes in unison, wiggling two noses, and butting sturdily with both heads as she nurses from a bottle entered her sixth day of life in apparent health today at the dairy of J. Elvin Thomson.

The calf was born Saturday. A normal twin was dead at birth. The mother, said by Thomson to have reared four normal calves, died two days after she bore the twins. The freak gives promise of living on, Thomson believes.

Each of the calf's heads has two eyes and complete nose. One head appears normal in size. The other is

smaller and with an under-developed lower jaw, offset from the neck on the left side.

The calf has an entirely normal body and the customary two ears, but appears to be growing three horns, the extra one at the neck junction of the two heads.

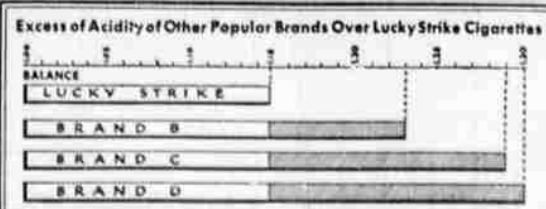
