RICH FURNISHING FUNDS FOR FIGHT AGAINST NEW DEAL

Crusaders Furnish Lobby Probers List of Donors— DuPonts Among Heaviest Contributors Is Revealed

WASHINGTON, April 9.—(AP)—A list of wealthy and prominent men from whom the Crusaders hoped to raise money to carry on their anti-New Deal activities was made public today by the senate lobby committee. It included Bernard Baruch, John W. Davis, Ogden Mills and a dozen other leading industrialists and lawyers all of whom Senator Gibson asked Fred G. Clark, national commander of the Crusaders, to identify.

Clark read a telegram sent March 11, 1935, to these prospects which said: "Earnestly desire your personal reaction to Crusaders broadcast over Columbia chain tonight."

List Has Poor Yield

Other names included Frank Kent, writer for the Baltimore Sun; Mark Sullivan, author and columnist; Wallace Alexander, Californian; Joseph P. Warburg, New York banker; Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., of General Motors, and William L. Clayton, of Houston, Texas.

"Somebody got you up a good list," Gibson commented.

"Didn't get us much money," Clark replied.

"We'll go into that later," Gibson said.

A group of 39 leading industrialists including two members of the Du Pont family, were revealed by the lobby committee to have contributed \$61,000 to the Crusaders.

These same 39 also were shown in a compilation made public by the committee to have contributed around \$178,000 to the American Liberty League and other organizations of a public or semi-public nature.

DuPonts Generous

Lamont DuPont was listed as giving \$10,000 to the Crusaders and \$25,000 to the league and ten other organizations. Irene DuPont gave \$10,000 to the Crusaders, and nearly \$90,000 to the others, including \$86,500 to the Liberty League.

Other large Crusader contributors were E. F. Hutton of New York, \$5,000; George M. Moffett, president of the Corn Products company of New York, \$5,000; J. Howard Pew, president of the Sun Oil company, \$4,000; Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president of General Motors, \$10,000; E. T. Weir, Pittsburgh steel man, \$8,250, and William Woodward, chairman of the board of the Central Hanover bank, \$14,000.

EDUCATOR BRANDS ISOLATION PLEAS 'SILLY NONSENSE'

America in International Arena Whether We Like It Or Not Says Prof. Bur- ton at Spokane Meeting

SPOKANE, Wash., April 9.—(AP)—Advocacy of isolation of the United States from the activities of the rest of the world was branded as "silly nonsense" here today by Dr. W. H. Burton, professor of education at the University of Southern California.

"Americans, finished with conquering a continent, have entered the international arena as a world power, whether we like it or not," he said at the opening of the 38th annual convention of the Inland Empire Education association.

"Worse, we enter the world arena at a time of great basic change. As

Smuts said, 'Humanity has struck its tent, civilization is on the march!'"

Americans Divided.

Somewhat alarmed at this change, because it is upsetting, Dr. Burton said, American citizens have divided themselves roughly into three classes.

"First, those who cry for a 'return to normalcy.' This is impossible, and never has happened," he said.

Second, there are those who shout for a totally new day. Democracy and capitalism have broken down, and we must go over to something else, they say. This is impossible and never happens abruptly in history, except when there is a complete breakdown of civilization, as, for instance, in Russia in 1917.

"The third group denies any fundamental changes are taking place; this is but a storm, and if we sit quietly in our hat everything will be all right soon. They should pull the covers over their heads."

Nearly 3,000 educators from Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Utah, British Columbia and Alaska were registered for the opening session. The convention will end Friday.

Teachers Can End Crime.

Dr. George E. Carrothers of the University of Michigan, placed in the hands of secondary school teachers the problem of lessening crime among juveniles.

"The present situation is so alarming," he declared, "it ought to shock us all wide awake."

"The secondary period is of vast

importance in the education of the oncoming generation," he continued.

"No one can minimize the possibilities of accomplishment when wholehearted programs are provided for the teen age youth. Most reform schools and reform measures as now organized are a sheer waste of time, energy and money, unless measured in some other way than by the good accomplished for the individuals subjected to their requirements."


