

# GENERAL FORCED TO BOARD PLANE BOUND FOR TEXAS

The chamber of deputies that Calles was responsible for the bombing of the Vera Cruz train last Monday in which 12 persons were killed.

Intervention Aim Claimed  
The leftists also claimed that he was fomenting anti-government agitation in an attempt to provoke the intervention of the United States in Mexico.

Obviously, General Calles has refrained from political activity since last December when he returned from six months' voluntary exile in the United States after losing his control over the nation's politics last June.

The government, however, apparently feared he was trying to regain his old political power through the regional confederation of workers and peasants, which has been controlled by Morones.

Action Kept Secret  
As a result, General Lazaro Cordenas, president of the republic, ordered the arrests, which were carried out with the strictest secrecy.

Calles was interviewed only yesterday by the Associated Press at his Santa Barbara ranch outside the capital. At that time he denied any interest in politics and it was obvious he had no premonition of his impending exile.

While waiting for the military escort to arrive at Santa Barbara and take him to the airport, General Calles told the Associated Press he believed he was being exiled because the government thought him responsible for speeches at a workers' meeting last Sunday where orators attacked President Calles.

Denies Responsibility  
"I have done nothing," General Calles stated, "nor am I responsible for the conditions in Mexico with the constant strikes, agitations and promotion of class hatred which the government itself is fomenting."

Accompanied by three sons, one daughter and other friends, the former strong man was taken to the airport where the other three prisoners already were waiting.

After a brief wait, they boarded the plane with three army officers as guards.

General Calles said he probably would go to San Diego, Cal., to live with his daughter, Mrs. Josefina Torre Blanca.

General Calles, now in his 59th year, rose to the historical position of Mexico's strongest ruler from humble birth as a peon in absolute poverty.

Calles began as a farm boy, educated himself, became a teacher, then a newspaper editor, then a soldier. The later phase of his life, which marked the start of his rapid rise in power, was when he fought in 1910 as a revolutionary against Porfirio Diaz.

He first became president in 1924, but previous to that he had maintained President Alvaro Obregon in power. Afterward he made Emilio Portes Gil, Pascual Ortiz Rubio and General Abelardo Rodriguez presidents in succession.

It was his approval which gave the presidency to Cardenas, the present chief executive of Mexico, in 1934. They split, more than a year ago, on questions of labor policy.

# SCHOOL DISTRICT ON CASH BASIS

All Medford school teachers were paid by check April 1 for the first time since 1932. The February 1 payroll was paid partially by check and the March 1 payroll by warrant. Some warrants may appear again the next salary payment, said E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of schools.

"We were just sort of bobbing at the surface in February," he stated, "and came clear out for the April payroll. We may bob back down again but we'll soon be out on top and completely off a warrant basis if conditions keep improving."

The Medford school district has been on a warrant basis since 1932 but on April 1 there was not an outstanding warrant against the district. Increased tax payments and curtailed expenses combined to make it possible to get off the warrant basis, it was stated.

Leaders, particularly, were guarded. Police were ordered to the home and offices of Attorney General Charles J. Margiotti in western Pennsylvania. Messages were sent over police telegraph systems in eight eastern states warning postoffice employees not to open "suspicious looking" packages over the Easter holiday.

Donald Lehman, 7, and Clinton Lehman, Jr., 2, barely escaped death in the explosion which killed Gallagher and injured the elder Lehman. Donald brought the package into the house and said: "A man gave it to me." Apparently it was brought by special delivery messenger, as was Maloney's.

Wilkes-Barre had been relieved of the strain of bitter mine union rivalry for a year. While two unions, one headed by Maloney, fought for supremacy, violence was a daily occurrence. Dynamitings were frequent. The newer union was virtually dissolved, however, and many of its members sought reinstatement in the United Mine Workers of America.
