

# LARGE INCREASE IN TURKEY CROP SEEN IN VALLEY

A 27 percent increase in the production of turkeys in the Rogue valley this year was predicted today by F. L. Wright who himself recently installed a modern hatchery on his Phoenix farm.

Mr. Wright expects to incubate 35,000 to 40,000 turkey eggs this year for Rogue valley poultry farms. He has orders for four weeks ahead and is now taking contracts for next year, he said. He does not plan to ship out of the valley, he added. The turkeys will be shipped in special containers when they are one or two days old. In addition to selling baby turkeys on his own account, he is engaged in custom incubation.

Mr. Wright has four large incubators with a capacity of 4,200 eggs and a separate hatchery with a capacity of 3,500. The eggs, he explained, remain in the incubators for 24 days and then they are transferred to the hatchery for four days. The hatchery building has forced ventilation, the air changing completely every minute.

For years Mr. Wright has been a field agent for a large milling company. His duties take him to farms in the valley where he gives counsel regarding the raising of poultry, proper feeding, disease control and equipment.

Our school is having an Easter play and also Easter egg hunt Friday. Parents and friends are invited to a picnic dinner at the school house at noon.



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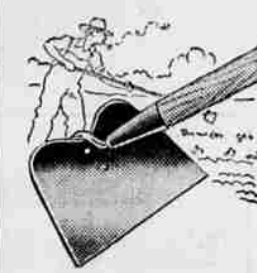
