# FLEEING PRISONERS ROUNDED UP

 WASHINGTON, April 13.—The wise New Dealers make a business of not knowing much about their spending plans. Congressional inquisitors have not been able to get much out of Mr. Hopkins on that subject.

The impression has been created that the federal handout next year will total \$1,800,000,000, as requested by the president, plus whatever is left over from this year, and no one ever knows how much will be left over.

That is, no one ever admitted knowing until Mr. Dan Bell, the non-political budget director, testified at a house tax hearing recently. He let it out while his hearers were so deeply involved in the taxation subject that they overlooked it.

Mr. Bell was heard to say that the amount obligated for this fiscal year is \$3,382,000,000 (not the amount allocated, mind you, but the amount which will be spent).

The left-over, he said, would be exactly \$1,128,000,000 on the basis of figures compiled as late as March 20. If you will add this left-over to the new relief fund, you will have President Roosevelt's secret—namely that the relief sock under his bed for the year beginning July 1 will contain about \$2,520,000,000.

## EX-CCC DOCTOR UNWILLING ALLY NEGRO FUGITIVE

Two Being Returned From California Gain Brief Freedom — Recaptured Near Crescent City, Cal.

CRESCENT CITY, Calif., April 13.—(AP)—Two prisoners resumed their journey from California to Oregon today—a journey punctuated by gunfire and escape.

Shackled by handcuffs, R. E. Ford, negro, and Dr. Thomas Flint, Jr., in custody of Sheriff William Howell of Coquille, Ore., fled from a northbound bus early yesterday.

Dr. Flint, who surrendered a few hours after the escape, said he is a physician and son of former State Senator Thomas Flint, Sr., of Hollister, Calif.

Ford was recaptured last night, unarmed and without show of resistance. He was seized by two officers near Last Chance, Calif., 10 miles south, and returned to Del Norte county jail here.

Ford was en route from Oakland, Calif., to Coquille to answer a burglary charge. Dr. Flint, recently a CCC camp surgeon near Springville, Calif., had been arrested in Visalia, Calif., for Bandon, Ore., authorities on a forgery complaint.

Sheriff Howell grappled with the fugitives for several hours before they were returned to the bus. The fugitives were recaptured near Crescent City, Cal.

## COUPLE RESCUED AFTER CRASH ON SKY HONEYMOON

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, April 13.—(AP)—They were "ready to die together" a scant 24 hours before, but today the flying honeymooners—Mr. and Mrs. Albert Almosino—rescued from hospital beds how they spent aweek without food or fire in cold stormy weather on an Alaska beach after their plane was wrecked.

Both Almosino, the pilot, and his 18-year-old bride, the former Joan McDonald of Minneapolis, Omaha and Spokane, were battered and worn from their experience when they arrived here last night from the cutter Cyane which found them at Princess Bay, 40 miles south of here.

Neither was injured in the plane wreck. "Get my wife!" was the first word shouted by Almosino, hoarse from shouting, and still holding the tattered shirt which had appeared barely discernible to the rescue party.

Rescuers found his wife in a rough lean-to and carried her to a small boat, thence to the Cyane. She was weak and wan when they reached her. But she smiled, tucked at her hair and said, apologetically: "Oh, I must be dirty!"

## HAGOOD RESTORED TO ACTIVE DUTY IN CHICAGO COMMAND

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—Major General Johnson Hagood was ordered restored to active duty today in command of the sixth corps area in Chicago.

Hagood was removed from command of the eighth corps area after he had criticized WPA money as "stage money." The disciplined officer conferred twice with President Roosevelt.

At Chicago he will replace Major General Frank R. McCoy. The assignment is effective May 2. McCoy will be transferred to command the second corps area at New York, succeeding Major General Dennis E. Nolan, who is retiring.

## FORECLOSURE ON ROGUE RIVER CO. SEEKS \$1,027,645

Suit for \$1,027,645.45 on a mortgage foreclosure, on a promissory note, and for sums advanced, has been filed in circuit court by Harvey S. Mudd of Los Angeles against the Rogue River company, operator of a chain of orchards and a packing plant here. It is the largest amount ever involved in a legal action in Jackson county.

The complaint alleges that on October 30, 1930, the plaintiff loaned \$575,129.88, on a promissory note, and at various times since has advanced sums to the defendant company with interest at seven per cent.

The Suncoast, Mira Vista, Glen Rosa, Clancy, Gate, Beeson, and Plant orchard tracts, and the Davis ranch are named in the suit, as parcels of land under the Rogue River company's operations.

## CUE FOR CAMPAIGN DUE TONIGHT WHEN ROOSEVELT TALKS

Party Leaders Expect Chief to Indicate Line for Coming Vote Drive — Talk to Be First of Series

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP) Refreshed for the campaign wars after his rest at sea, President Roosevelt made final preparations today for his speech at a Democratic rally in Baltimore tonight.

New Deal supporters looked to the chief executive to give further indication of the line the administration will follow in the big drive toward the November election.

From this address, which will be made before the state's Young Democratic clubs at the Fifth Regiment armory after an old-time torchlight procession, the party leaders are expected to take their cues for the campaign struggles.

## PAIR WOUNDED BY JEALOUS MEXICAN

KLAMATH FALLS, April 13.—(AP) Officers today were combing the Rogue River country in search of Raymond Martin, Mexican trawler, who is accused of wounding Marie Palmer, 15, and Buster Dickens, Indian, 24, at Sprague River last night.

Dickens and Miss Palmer were leaving church when several shots were fired. The girl was hit in the side and Dickens was shot in the arm.

## PLAN LAW TEST IN PENSION PAYMENT

PORTLAND, April 13.—(AP)—A test to determine whether counties which must finance aid to the poor by warrants can deposit a master warrant with banks or must pay each case by individual warrant will be presented to the Oregon supreme court soon.

If a county could deposit a master warrant, receiving cash from banks, it would simplify technical bookkeeping procedure. Payment by individual warrants would require banks to keep records of each warrant received for presentation to the county for repayment and also would complicate county records.

## ACTION ON FEHL RELEASE AWAITS MARTINS RETURN

SALEM, Ore., April 13.—(AP)—If Earl H. Fehl, serving a four-year penitentiary term for participation in the Jackson county ballot thefts, is not released upon expiration of his minimum sentence tomorrow, legal action to secure his freedom through a writ of habeas corpus may be instituted, George Rhoten, one of his attorneys, reported.

Rhoten conferred with Fehl at the prison this morning, and later said a definite decision on the action to be taken would not be made until the arrival here of H. V. Schmalz, Burns lawyer and chief counsel for the prisoner, and until Governor Martin has indicated whether he will parole Fehl.

W. L. Gosman, secretary to the governor's board, said there would be no meeting of the board until the governor has considered the case. He said he believed the board would recommend a parole, effective April 15, the expiration of Fehl's minimum sentence of 32 months.

Saturday the governor said at Bremerton he would make no decision in the case until his return. A parole for Fehl, who is eligible next Wednesday because of time off for good behavior, has been protested by District Attorney Codding of Jackson county, unless the parole would be conditioned upon Fehl's not returning to the county.

Fehl was to have been automatically released from the prison under the interpretation of a 1923 attorney general's opinion. An opinion rendered Saturday held paroles were mandatory for release prior to the termination of a maximum sentence. The attorney general's office stated prison officials had been releasing prisoners automatically on minimum sentences under a misinterpretation of the 1923 opinion. All paroles must be approved by the governor before executed.

## COUPLE TRY SUICIDE IN PORTLAND HOTEL

PORTLAND, Ore., April 13.—(AP)—Hospital attendants said today that William B. Nays, 65, Green Acres, Wash. rancher, and his wife, Cora, 63, were in "fairly good condition" and spent a "good night."

The couple was taken to the hospital Sunday after being found in a hotel bathroom with their wrists slashed. A patrolman, P. O. Hutchins, said he found a note to an undertaking parlor letters to friends and another note ordering a \$50 draft and some cash given to a son, Bernard B. Nays, of Seattle.

## SAFeway STORES WILL OCCUPY NEW 6TH ST. BUILDING

Modern Food Market With Ample Parking Space Is Company's Plan to Serve Rogue Valley Patrons

Safeway Stores, Inc., will occupy the building being erected by John R. Tomlin on the north side of East Sixth street near Bartlett. It was announced today by T. M. Medford, district manager.

The company will move from its present location at 113 North Central, its new home being only a block to the east. That firm also operates a store at West Main and Holly streets.

The new building will give the store more interior space. The adjoining land at the northeast corner of East Sixth and Bartlett streets will be used as a parking area for patrons' automobiles, the area being 70 by 100 feet.

## ITALIANS CLAIM DESSYE REACHED

ROME, April 13.—(AP)—Italian press dispatches from Ethiopia said today the fascist advance guard of the northern army had entered Dessye, former field headquarters of Emperor Haile Selassie.

The press reports have not been officially confirmed. Earlier, Marshal Pietro Badoglio reported his troops are pushing down along Lake Tana, sphere of British influence and headwaters of the blue Nile.

## SECRET CLUE HELD IN TITERTON SLAYING

NEW YORK, April 13.—(AP)—Existence of a secret clue which may lead police to the slayer of Mrs. Nancy Evans Titterton was disclosed today, although officials declined to make public its nature.

It was believed, however, to be an article which the man had left behind after he strangled the 34-year old actress and placed her body in the bathtub of her Beckman Place apartment.

## ROGUE VALLEY FACES CONTINUED HOT SPELL

Medfordites stripped down to summer-weight attire today as the mercury continued for the fourth successive day to linger in the higher brackets. Little change in temperature was expected for tomorrow by the weather bureau.

The temperature yesterday soared to a maximum of 85, a new all-time peak for the date. The mercury reached a mark of 82 early this afternoon and was still climbing. Low this morning was 46, one degree higher than yesterday's minimum.

## ROSEBURG BACK ON CASH BASIS

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 13.—(AP)—The city of Roseburg today went on a cash basis in payment of current bills. City Treasurer T. J. Brown this morning called for payment of all outstanding city warrants, amounting to approximately \$14,000 and cash in hand to meet current bills for a least a few months.

It is anticipated that the city will be forced to return to a warrant basis for a short time during the summer period, but expects to complete the year on a cash basis, following the receipt of fall tax collections.

## ROOSEVELT EYES EASTER EGG ROLL

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—The White House Easter egg rolling reached its zenith shortly after 2 o'clock today when President Roosevelt, on the arm of his son Elliott and accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt appeared on the south porch.

A cheer went up from the crowd—more than 17,000 had been counted in at the gates—as the president waved his greetings.
