SONS CAST GIVES 'EMPEROR JONES' AT HIGH TONIGHT

For the past few years, Southern Oregon Normal school play casts have been presenting consistently good dramatic presentations under the direction of Angus L. Bowmer. Tonight, for the first time, the group will bring a play to Medford, "Emperor Jones," by Eugene O'Neill. Many Medfordites who have been interested in the SONS productions but who have found it impossible to journey to Ashland to witness them, are welcoming this opportunity of seeing this phase of the school's work, a phase which is rapidly gaining the attention of an ever-widening circle of critics.

Those who saw initial performances of "Emperor Jones" in Ashland April 3 and 4, concur in the opinion that staging and scenery are highly unusual and worthy of special mention. All scenes except the first take place in a tropical jungle, which presents a difficult problem to amateur stage artists. The SONS groups, under the direction of Mrs. Bowmer, have used for the first time draperies as a medium for representing the supernatural yet beautiful tropical vegetation. Outstanding lighting effects heighten the eerie atmosphere of the jungle through which Emperor Jones flees in ever-increasing terror from his avenging subjects and in which are seen the accusing hallucinations out of his past which finally accomplish the complete disintegration of his mind.

While the spectacular effects attained by the technical staff came in for a great deal of attention at the first performances, many considered the dramatic accomplishments of the young players exceptional and equal to, if not surpassing, any previous efforts of the group. "Far from amateurish," is a phrase frequently heard from members of audiences at the previous performances.

Heading the cast are Robert Stedman in the title role, and Director Bowmer as Smithers, a cockney-trader much inferior in strength of mind and purpose to Emperor Jones and a thoroughly despicable character.

The play, brought to Medford under the auspices of the 20-30 club, will be presented at 8 o'clock, in the Senior high school auditorium.

VACCINE SERVICE BEING CONTINUED
