said for many years that certain things could not be done in sustaining farm prices. Now he says they can be done. To hear his discussion of how agricultural surpluses can be controlled, one would think he had invented our program.

Landon, the Democratic chairman said, "I implied that the Democrats had not gone far enough in raising farm prices."

"This is a virtual acceptance," said Farley, "of the principles upon which Mr. Roosevelt has conducted his campaign in 1932."

Results of the Illinois and Nebraska primaries continued to command the interest of capital observers. The primaries in Pennsylvania and Massachusetts will be held April 28.

MORE PUPILS GIVEN SMALLPOX VACCINE; NEW CASES LISTED

Fifty-four pupils of the Oak Grove school and 96 of the Seventh Day Adventist academy near Jacksonville were vaccinated today against smallpox.

The vaccine was administered at the Oak Grove school by Dr. A. N. Johnson, county health officer, with the assistance of Miss Blanche Runala, supervisor of county nurses. Dr. Harold B. Gillis, assisted by Miss Florence Weiler, county nurse, officiated at the academy.

Melba O'Lea, 9, who resides on Cherry street, outside the city limits and is a pupil at the Washington school, was reported by the county health officer today to be suffering from smallpox.

Dr. L. D. Inskip, city health officer, reported four cases of smallpox today. They were Dale Waltermire, 11, Irene Waltermire, 7, and their father, Harold G. Waltermire, of 903 South Holly street and Mrs. J. M. O'Neill, of 816 South Holly street. The two children are pupils at the Washington school. All cases were described as mild.

ADVICE SOUGHT ON FOREST FIRE CASE

A complete record of the fire that swept over three acres in the upper Applegate section last Saturday was sent today to the U. S. regional forest service office in Portland for decision as to what legal steps, if any, should be taken.

The fire, according to the report, started from the burning of rubbish by D. Bush near his mining claim in Park Gulch on Elliott creek. The regional office will decide whether or not charges should be filed against Bush for starting a fire that did damage to the property of others, it was

stated by K. P. McEneaney, assistant forester in charge of fire control for the Rogue river national forest. The report cited extenuating circumstances, stating that Bush tried to control the fire until he was almost exhausted, seeing that it was spreading he called a neighbor and then notified men of the Applegate CCC camp who put the fire out, the report recited.

THREATEN KIDNAP KING'S CHILDREN

BRUSSELS, April 16. — (AP) — A threat to kidnap the motherless children of King Leopold of the Belgians was disclosed today with the arrest at Liege, eastern Belgium, of a 31-year-old former convict, Nicholas Eisen.

Police of the city of Liege said the arrested man confessed to writing letters to the king, threatening to abduct the royal children, whose mother, Queen Astrid, was killed in an automobile accident, unless money was left in woods near the border city.

Police said they laid in wait in the woods, in an attempt to capture the author of the letters, but that he failed to appear.
