'It's one of the best teams ever to represent America, and I believe we have a fine chance of keeping the trophy we never have lost,' said Mrs. Glenna Collett-Vare of Philadelphia, national champion and team captain.
Members of the team, in addition to Mrs. Vare, are Mrs. Maureen Orcutt-Crews, Miami; Mrs. Opal S. Hill, Kansas City; Mrs. Leona D. Cheney, Los Angeles; Patsy Berg, Minneapolis; Marion Miley, Lexington, Ky.; Charlotte Glutting, Orange, N. J.; and Mrs. Frank Goldthwaite, Fort Worth, Texas. The Curtis cup matches will be played at Glenageary, Scotland, May 6. Mrs. Vare said she hadn't made up her mind yet who would play.

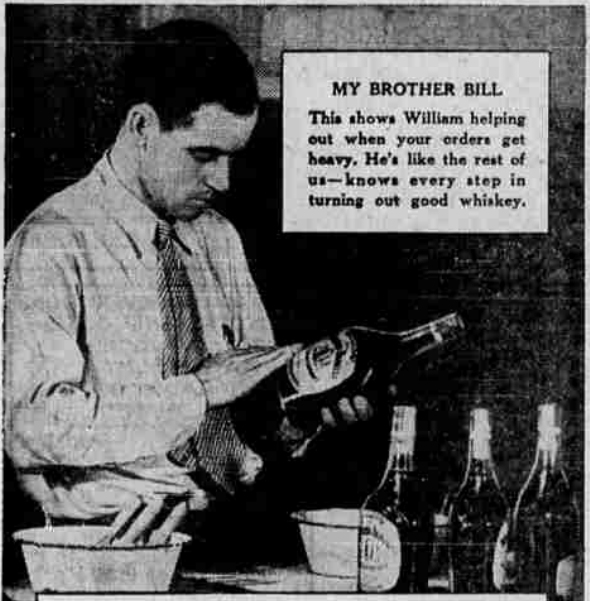
