WEST'S FIRST PRESS GOOD AS NEW

Presentation of a new inking device to replace the one destroyed some years ago by fire has made the historic Washington hand press at the University of Oregon as good as new. The new brayer was given to the school by W. H. Brandes of Portland. The press first began its work in Oregon City in 1846, where on February 6 it printed the Spectator, the first newspaper west of the Rocky Mountains. It was presented to the University school of Journalism in 1915 by Harrison and Webster Kincaid, who formerly published the Oregon State Journal on the site in Eugene. MOTHER OF FIVE DIES ON GALLOWES

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., April 16.—(AP)—Mrs. Dorothy Waddingham, 34-year-old mother of five children, died on the gallows of the Winslow Green prison today while police guarded the approaches against a demonstration in protest at "this disgrace."

Mrs. Violet van der Elst, energetic campaigner against capital punishment, organized the demonstration, broadcasting appeals to a crowd of 2000 to attempt to prevent the hanging.

The throng looked on quietly, however, some smiling at Mrs. van der Elst's exhortations, some praying for Mrs. Waddingham while the convicted poison slayer of a patient in her Nottingham nursing home died within the prison.

King Edward himself was the only one who could have saved the woman from the gallows by granting a last-minute reprieve, after Home Secretary Sir John Simon denied appeals for clemency.

SCHOOL HOUSE USE IN HANDS OF BOARDS

SALEM, April 16.—(AP)—Attorney-General E. VanWinkle ruled in an opinion to the state department of education, that decisions of district school boards granting or refusing use of school buildings for uses as a civic center were final.

The law provides, the attorney-general pointed out, for use of the buildings by civic groups, but the district board has discretionary powers as to what type organizations may use it. The decision in that event would be final.
