

Track and Field Stars of Five Cities Will Compete Here Saturday

OVER 120 YOUTHS ARE ENTERED FOR THIRTEEN EVENTS

Grants Pass and Medford Given Edge On Basis of Past Performance; Kerby and Ashland Send Men

Over 120 track stars from Roseburg, Grants Pass, Kerby, Ashland and Medford will compete in the largest meet ever held in this city at the new senior high school athletic field on South Cascade tomorrow afternoon starting at 2:00 o'clock.

On the basis of past records, Grants Pass and Medford are expected to be the two strongest bidders for honors, with Coach Bowerman of Medford conceding Grants Pass, under L. L. Deal the inside edge. "I think we'll take the 440 yard relay, but I can't see any firsts in any of the other events," Bowerman said today.

Joe Cronin's Thumb Broken — Ben Chapman Has Pain in Side — Dick Bartell Suffering From Grippe

Baseball's professional mourners, the managers, already are waiting over a dose of sickness, injuries and form reversals.

With the season but three days old, Joe Cronin, the high-priced playing manager of the Red Sox, has a broken thumb that Chapman of the Yankees is suffering from muscular pains in his side which caused him to retire from yesterday's game with Washington, and Dick Bartell of the Giants is in the sick bay suffering from grippe.

Causing further managerial headaches, many of the game's ace pitchers, including the irrepressible Brother Dean, are already smarting under defeats and a gust of typical Dodger dizziness has begun to swirl around Casey Stengel.

Fox's Pays Dividend

On the other side of the ledger, however, Owner Tom Yawkey of the Red Sox saw Jimmy Fox, who tied Hank Greenberg for home run honors with 36 last year, start paying dividends in this respect yesterday with his first round trip sock of the year.

Cronin is expected to be out of action for two or three weeks with a double fracture of the thumb, received as the Red Sox drubbed the Athletics, 10-4.

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The Giants notched their third straight win over Brooklyn, 7-5. The tying and winning runs crossed the plate in the ninth inning when Jordan and Lindstrom of the Flabushers collided while attempting to catch what appeared to be an easy fly.

Chapman left the fray in the fourth inning but the Yankees went on to defeat the Washington Senators, 6-5.

As the Senators were dropping their first game in three starts, the Pirates also were getting their first taste of defeat. The Cincinnati Reds hung up their first victory of the year as they downed the Buccs, 7-4. Bud Hasey walloped his second homer of the year. Cuyler and Goodman of the Reds hit for round trips, but the Phillies downed the Boston Reds, 7-5.

The Tigers-Indiana, Browns-White Sox games were postponed because of cold weather.

FANDOM AT RANDOM

This week's wrestling matches, and those the week following, should be among the best ever held in Medford. Both Prince Shiki Ibn Ali Hassan Mihalakis and Frankie Peck have long covered Pete Belcastro's Pacific coast as a junior heavyweight champion long belt and neither will spare the horses in an effort to take the elimination bout. Both men express a calm assurance that they will take the match Monday and then drop Belcastro the following week, although neither is quite so confident about the last.

Mihalakis tested Belcastro's mettle last week, and Peck had an opportunity to do so on two occasions, and their opinion of the champion's prowess increased tremendously. One of them will have another surprise when they meet Pete with his title at stake. With possession of that belt risked, Belcastro becomes a wildcat. The man that beats him is going to have to be some man.

Something we've noticed about wrestlers is that, even though most of them come from big cities, they seem to like Medford as well as any place they've ever been. It isn't because the houses here pay them more, for they don't, of course, but it's just because of the people in the town, the scenery around, and the opportunities for vacationing. Frankie Peck has become so enthused over the city that he now bills himself from Medford. Prince Mihalakis plans on returning for a lengthy summer vacation here. Danny Savich admits that he likes the place particularly, and Pete Belcastro's admiration for the valley is well known.

Ken Hollis didn't like Medford a week ago when he was here, and he looked so forlorn and lonely that we felt sorry for him and invited him out for dinner. He wasn't hungry, it seemed, and thought Medford was probably the worst hole he'd ever stepped into.

We saw some kids out on Stewart avenue playing a game called "peg-it" the other night. We saw the same game up in northeastern Canada a few years ago but had completely forgotten how much fun it is. We'll give you a brief description and you can try it some evening.

The equipment needed is a length of broom handle about three feet long and another piece about eight inches long. Two, or as many as you like, can play. The batsman, armed with the long piece of broom handle, digs a small trench, about a foot long, three inches wide, and three inches deep, in the ground, the long end of the trench pointing toward the fielders. He lays the short stick across this hole.

Then, putting the end of the long stick under the short one, he gives it a boost down the field. If the fielders catch it, the batter's out, but if they don't, the one nearest picks it up, and attempts, in three tries, to throw it into the trench. The batsman defends the trench, trying to knock the short stick away. If, in three tries, the fielder gets the short stick into the trench, the batsman has to pick up the stick, toss it into the air, and bounce it three times on his bat. The third blow he attempts to knock the pin back into the field, and the game starts over. If he doesn't hit it three times, he's out and the fielder goes to bat.

It sounds simple, and it is simple, but it's a lot of fun. And it's good exercise. If the initial boost of the stick is too easily caught, the game can be made more difficult by knocking the stick away by hitting it with the bat.

PECK AND PRINCE IN RIGID TRAINING FOR MONDAY FRAY

With a chance at the Pacific coast now worn by Pete Belcastro hanging in the balance, Prince Shiki Mihalakis of Arabia and Frankie Peck of San Francisco have both gone into rigid training for their elimination bout on the main event wrestling card at the Armory Monday.

With warm weather bringing the streams of southern Oregon up to comfortable temperatures, Prince Mihalakis is getting his conditioning by the swimming route, while Peck is confining his efforts to road work. Peck wrestles the main event at Vallejo, Cal., tonight.

Belcastro, who will tangle April 27 with the winner of next Monday's event, has gone into hibernation in northern California to whip himself into shape for the contest. It will be the second time that Belcastro has defended his title in this city, he having unmercifully hammered Johnny Soto into defeat on the previous occasion.

The middle event between George ("Wildcat") Wilson, all-American halfback from the University of Washington, and Danny Savich, all-American guard from the University of Utah, is creating great interest. Wilson was rated as one of the all-time greats on the Washington gridiron with Savich little known outside his own community in Utah until his great work brought him to the attention of the all-American board. The age-old argument between the big and little schools for honors is expected to be settled in small part.

Bob Kenniston, mad marine from Gold Hill, in a letter to Promoter Mack Lillard, stated that he had something new to show Medford wrestling fans in the way of speed and aggressiveness. Reports filtering into the city from California papers indicate that Kenniston now risks strongly on a flying drop-kick attack, and that he has added several more spectacular holds.

He yielded one hit in the two innings.

Kowalk, during a year in the Roseburg area, pitched the Tye camp team through a successful season; held the mound for the Sutherland team in several games, and pitched a few games for a Roseburg team.

J. M. Henderson, recreation director in the Tye camp, succeeded in attracting the attention of National league scouts to Kowalk, with the result that he was signed this year as a result with the Cubs.

NEW YORK, April 17.—(AP)—Edward Lee of New York wore the world's amateur three-cushion billiards crown today, winning the title to the United States for the first time as the championship tournament came to its last day.

Lee clinched the title last night when he gave a sound trouncing to Hendricks Robyns of Holland, 50 to 35, for his sixth straight victory. His closest rival, Eugene Deardorff of St. Louis, has won four games and lost two, taking second place with a 30-38 triumph over Alfred Lagahe of France, the defending champion, last night, and each has only one more game to play.
