A good-will party for all war veterans and their families will be held here at the K. F. hall on Thursday, April 30, as the result of a meeting of the Veterans' Allied Council at the Legion hall in Ashland last night.

At the meeting, presided over by Carol J. Parker, corps commander of the council, representatives of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War of Medford; Veterans of Foreign Wars of both Medford and Ashland; the American Legion of Medford and Ashland and the United Spanish-American War Veterans of Medford were in attendance.

The good-will party, which will be open to all veterans and their families, whether or not they are affiliated with any veteran organization, promises to be one of the most brilliant social events of the spring season, officers stated.

Joe Wood of Medford, representing the Spanish War Veterans, will act as general chairman for the party. Mr. Parker said.

Earl For of this city, representing the American Legion, will be chairman of entertainment, while Mrs. Elythe Martin, president of American Legion auxiliary of Medford, will be chairman of the hostess committee. Mrs. Nettie Cassman of Central Point, representing the Disabled American Veterans auxiliary, will be chairman of the serving committee; Nick Young of the Spanish War Veterans here will have charge of the refreshments, and Harvey Cassman, commander of the Disabled American Veterans, will be chairman of the housing committee.

The good-will party is being sponsored by the Allied Veterans' Council, an organization devoted to the co-ordination of veteran activities in southern Oregon.

ROME, April 17.—A high source said today that Premier Mussolini intends to smash the Ethiopian empire of Emperor Haile Selassie and is prepared to face any international actions which may result.

This source said the Italian troops in the field would proceed resolutely to the capture of Addis Ababa, toward which troops already are moving from the high road from Dessale.

Fascists rejoiced at reports that their east African armies were at last "actually on the road to Addis Ababa," while warning Great Britain not to "provoke Italy" too far.

Persistent reports circulated in well-informed quarters that Gen. Rodolfo Graziani's southern army had launched a movement on Harar, second city of Ethiopia, accompanying a daring drive by Marshal Pietro Badoglio's northern forces on the capital.

Military sources said all signs pointed toward a transfer of peace negotiations from Geneva, where Italy was eyeing Britain on the eve of its anticipated final triumph, to the field headquarters of Marshal Badoglio, fascist commander-in-chief.

ADDIS ABABA, April 17.—(AP)—Tribal chieftains and cabinet ministers of Ethiopia met in a secret session at the imperial palace today as government officials conceded that the situation on the northern front was critical.

Foreign Minister Belstesen Gueta Herouy, acting head of the government in the absence of Emperor Haile Selassie, summoned the leaders of the beleaguered nation to the meeting.

Government officials said the situation was serious, in view of advances by the invading Italian armies, but insisted that it was not yet hopeless.
