EUGENE FARMER'S SANITY DOUBTED

EUGENE, April 17.—(AP)—A sanity hearing was tentatively scheduled for Charles Clements, 57, farmer of the Christianer Gap area west of here, today as officers considered his action in allegedly threatening anyone who attempted to enter his land.

Clements was arrested here yesterday on charges of threatening to commit a felony after he is said to have held up work on grading of route F west of Eugene. He refused to accept a price for right-of-way offered by the county after road viewers had set a value on the land needed. Officers said he threatened to protect his property "with gun smoke if necessary," following his refusal to sell.

County officials say he was offered \$375 for the 2.43 acres of land needed, but the farmer held out for \$630.

"Receiving a fresh impetus from the more balmy spring weather, business gathered new momentum during the week," it was stated.

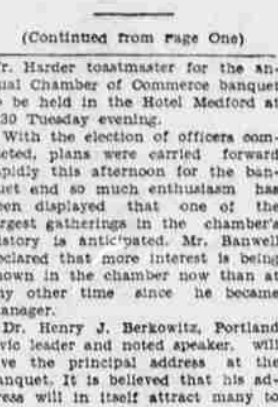
"Retail distribution naturally fell back to a slower pace, following the final week of the Easter shopping rush, but in many sections surpassed the 1935 comparative."

HOOD RIVER, April 17.—(AP)—Scores of orchardists from this district and the fruit areas of Skamania and Klickitat counties, Washington, are negotiating for funds from the Mid-Columbia Production Credit Corporation to finance crops, officials say.

The association has set a maximum of 62½ cents per box to growers. Last year about \$20,000 was advanced.

Bar Silver Price Up Quarter Cent

NEW YORK, April 17.—(AP)—The local price of imported bar silver was lifted today ¼ cent an ounce to 43 cents.

This is the first change in the New York quotation since January 20 when the price was lowered to 44½ cents an ounce.

The price of domestic bar silver was unchanged at 77 cents an ounce. London cables reported that bar silver there had risen 5-16 of a penny to 20½ pence an ounce.
