The amateur who grows vegetables as a recreation has it all over his fellow hobby riders, for his playtime hours at this avocation not only cost him nothing, but actually save him money.



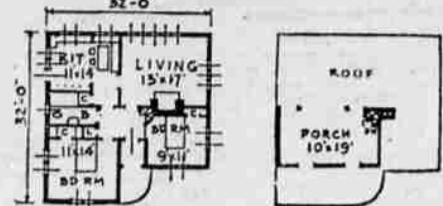
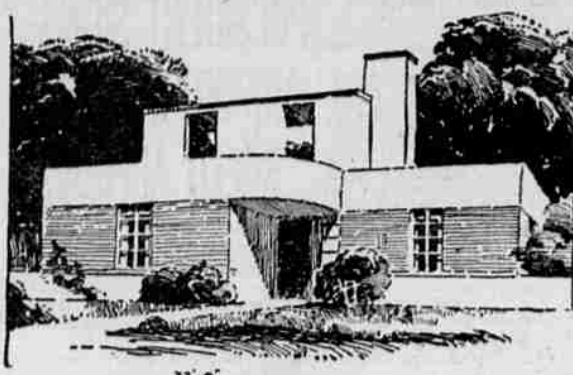
A Beautiful Vegetable Garden May Be Made by Planting Annual Flowers in Rows and as Edging. They can Be Used for Cutting.

APRIL 28 LIMIT ON CALYX SPRAY

The calyx spray on apple and pear trees should be completed by April 28, according to the advice of C. B. Corby, assistant county agent, and L. G. Gentner, entomologist of the Southern Oregon experiment station.

Get flats ready for tomato sets. You will want several dozen healthy plants for the garden, and they should be transplanted at least one indoors before finally setting them outside.
