

Grants Pass Wins First In Five Way High Track Meet; Medford Second

KERBY IS THIRD, LITHIA TEAM AND ROSEBURG IN TIE

Winners Grab 51 Points, Excelling in Sprints And Weight Events.

An inspired Grants Pass track team, placing first in the mile run, the shot put, discus, pole vault, and the low and high hurdles, amassed 51 points in the five way meet held here yesterday. 9 1/2 markers ahead of the next team, Medford.

Kerby nabbed third place with 30 1/2, and Roseburg and Ashland tied for last with 20 each. The locals failed to finish close in the sprints, but took three firsts, Linnell running away with the 440, Ettinger outdistancing the field easily in the broad jump, and the relay team taking that event by a wide margin.

Walley of Ashland nabbed first in the 100 and 220 sprints, and Bromley of Grants Pass duplicated that feat by turning in wins in the low and high hurdles. A crowd of approximately 250 people saw the contests, which were the first of their kind ever held here.

In the mile run, in which Medford was expected to finish high, McCollum of Grants Pass showed so much steam in his quarter lap spurt that he dropped the rest of the crowd far back, to finish 30 yards in the lead, still running easily.

HUSKY CREW WINS TRIPLE TRIUMPH OVER CALIFORNIA

Easy Victory Scored And Records Smashed—Headed For Olympics and Poughkeepsie.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 18.—(AP)—Hiding on the tail of a stiff southerly wind, the University of Washington rowing fleet scored a smashing, triple triumph over the touted Bears of California for the second successive year here today, and busted every record ever made on Lake Washington.

The mighty Huskies trounced the California varsity by three lengths, the junior-varsity by five and a half and the freshmen by five.

And the way the smooth-stroking Washington oarsmen left all three Bear crews in their wake made them look like they were rowing straight for Berlin and the Olympic games.

It was the sixth time in the 33 years of the Pacific coast intercollegiate regatta that Washington had scored a complete sweep in all three races.

The Washington varsity streaked over the grueling three-mile course in 15 minutes, 56.4 seconds compared with the old mark of 16:33.4 hung up by the Huskies in 1934.

California, trailing 12 seconds behind the northerners in 16:08, also was well under the record, giving Coach Ky Ebricht good reason to believe he may have another national championship crew by the time the Poughkeepsie regatta rolls around in June.

Washington won the junior-varsity three-mile event in 16:14.2, to cut a big slice off the former mark of 17:14.5 established by California in 1922. The Bears trailed along in 16:36.1.

The two-mile skirmish, the Huskies knocked down the early choppy waves in the unbelievable time of 10:24.8. This was announced as official but four watches on the press boat caught the Washington boys around 10:40. California's time was announced as 10:31.4.

The old record made by the Huskies in 1934 was 11:24.8. And then compare these figures with the records established years ago over the Leitch-Madrona course and you'll have an idea how fast the powerful crews were sailing today. The old varsity figure was 15:58, made in 1922; junior-varsity 16:26.2 in 1926, and the freshman 19:44.4 in 1926. All were established by Washington.

GOLD HILL PRIDE, PECK AND PRINCE ON ARMORY CARD

Easy Victory Scored And Records Smashed—Headed For Olympics and Poughkeepsie.

Fefe Belcastro's championship belt, representing supremacy in the junior heavyweight division of wrestling on the Pacific coast, is today reposing in the storeroom of the Mall Tribune, ready to go on display at the Armory tomorrow night when Prince Mihalika of Arabia and Frankie Peck of San Francisco tangle to see who meets Belcastro next week. Belcastro released the belt to Promoter Mack Lillard on Friday and will defend it against the winner of tomorrow's bout on the following Monday.

Both of the combatants tomorrow will have a Medford following. Each holds a win over the champion. Whether Peck, whose rugged physique has weathered the storms of many versatile attacks, will be able to turn back the Prince's two great holds—the camel look and the dragon scissors—seems to depend strongly on how soon he gets his skull cracking headlock and how tenaciously he hangs onto it.

In six weeks of grappling here, Mihalika has won every match, depending not alone on those two grips, but using them as the coup de grace in each instance. All of Peck's wins, similarly, have come through the use of the headlock. The bout has created much interest.

The middle event brings together two All-American football players for the first time in a Medford ring when George "Wildcat" Wilson, ex-Washington flash, tangles with Danny Savich of Utah, in an Australian system match. More flying tackles are expected in this event than are usually seen in an Army-Notre Dame football game. Wilson's slugging tendencies are considered more dangerous than Savich's thrusts, but the scrappy Rocky Mountain conference guard is considered faster, and has a command of more fancy grips.

Bob Kenaston, erstwhile "mad marine" of Gold Hill whose erratic squabbling with the referee, flights outside the ropes to tie his shoes when they needed no tying, and boisterous delight in drumming on an opponent's paunch earned him the hatred of most local fans, returns to mix with Frank Taylor, towering Ohio state athlete, in the opener. While on a tour of southern California, Kenaston picked up a wealth of new wrestling skill. In his former matches here he depended almost entirely on his "Gold Hill crab" hold, a reverse kneeling-headlock. He has evolved several improvements on that hold and now also employs a flying drop kick and several tricky "leg holds."

The match may be the last here for Kenaston before he starts east on a wrestling tour, although Promoter Mack Lillard is making an attempt to secure him for several appearances.
