PRESIDENT SIGNS AIRPORT PROJECT, SPEED APPROVAL

A telegram received yesterday by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce from Senator Charles L. McNary stated that President Roosevelt had signed the Medford municipal airport project. The plan, the senator said, now goes to the controller for final approval and allocation of WPA funds.

The project approved by President Roosevelt, it was explained at the WPA office here, is a unit of a \$366,000 airport modernization plan. Which particular unit was approved by the president was not specified by Senator McNary.

Two units have been up for consideration in Washington recently. One called for an allotment of \$40,000 and the other for \$117,000. It was thought by the Chamber of Commerce that it was the \$117,000 unit that had been given presidential approval as that had been the latest one mentioned in Washington dispatches.

Miss Runels outlined the work done and mentioned a number of highly successful achievements brought about by these efforts.

2100 VACCINATED IN HEALTH DRIVE

About 1,400 persons were vaccinated against smallpox last week by Jackson county health authorities and 700 by private physicians. Dr. A. N. Johnson, county health officer, estimated yesterday. Many came to the county offices yesterday to have the vaccine administered, he said.

The disease broke out Friday in Wimer in the Evans valley and 68 persons in the community were vaccinated by Dr. Johnson. Those reported having smallpox were three school children, two adults and one child of pre-school age. Thirty-four pupils were vaccinated in the Evans valley public school aged 28, or the entire enrollment in the valley's Seventh Day Adventist school.

All the attendants at the Wimer store and postoffice were also vaccinated. Contacts who declined to be vaccinated were quarantined like the six having the disease. Dr. Johnson said.

Smallpox struck again in the Harold G. Waltemire family yesterday, it being reported by Dr. L. D. Inskip, city health officer, that Mrs. Waltemire now has the disease. Earlier in the week Mr. Waltemire and two children were stricken. The family resides at 903 South Holly street.
