MEDICA SPLASHES TO FIRST VICTORY FOR U.S. SWIMMERS

Coast Star Captures 400-Meter Free Style — Girls Team Sweeps Springboard Diving Events

BERLIN, Aug. 12.—(AP)—A record-smashing performance by Jack Medica of Seattle gave the United States her first Olympic men's swimming victory today.

The husky Pacific coast star captured the 400 meter free style championship in four minutes 44.3 seconds after 19-year-old Marjorie Geering of Los Angeles and her two team mates swept the springboard diving championship.

The "Seattle Seal" came from behind to over-take Japan's crack Shumple Uto in the last 20 meters and clip one full second off the former Olympic mark hung up by Uto in the preliminary trials.

Medica's time, however, was considerably slower than the world record of 4:38.7 he made two years ago.

Kiefer Breaks Record

Adolph Kiefer of Chicago, star of the men's team, shattered the eight year old Olympic record in winning his heat in the trials of the Olympic 100-meter back stroke event.

The Chicagoan captured the first of five preliminary heats in one minute, 6.3 seconds, bettering George Kojac's mark of 1:08.2, as well as the latest world record of 1:07.4 made by Al Vande Weghe of Paterson, N. J., two years ago at Honolulu.

Kiefer won by a margin of a length and a half over the Japanese star, Masaji Koyama.

The American quartet, Elizabeth Ryan, Bernice Lapp, Mavis Freeman and Olive McKean, won a close decision over Great Britain in the first heat of the women's 400 meter relay with Canada, third, Hungary fourth, and Austria fifth.

The Americans' time was 4:47.1, Great Britain, 4:47.2.

Miss Geering, diminutive California aerial artist, performed a difficult one and one-half back dive on her last effort, gaining 16.00 points for an aggregate of 80.25 and enabling her to pass the highly-fancied Katherine Rawls of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., who took second with 68.25 points.

Mrs. Dorothy Boynton Hill of Los Angeles, was third, with 52.36.

The blanket finish netted 19 points and put the American side, with a total of 20 points, in the lead for women's swimming team honors.

GRID STARS HEAD FOR TUSSELE WITH CHAMPION LIONS

Bierman Will Be Head Coach for Collegians in Practice Starting Thursday — Set Game for September 1

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The cream of the nation's 1935 college football crop—53 stars from schools in almost every section of the country—headed today for Chicago and the opening of practice for their battle the night of September 1 against the Detroit Lions, professional champions of the world.

Bernie Bierman, whose great Minnesota teams have not been beaten since 1932, will direct the All-Stars in the third annual pro-amateur battle, to be played at Soldier Field. Bierman yesterday was named head coach in a nation-wide poll conducted by the Chicago Tribune and 162 other newspapers. Named as his assistants were Elmer Layden of Notre Dame, Alvin (Doc) McMillin of Indiana, Lou Little of Columbia and Lynn Waldorf of Northwestern.

Start Practice Thursday

The All-Americans will start practice Thursday at Doyne Stadium, Northwestern's home battle ground, and will attempt to do what two previous all-star aggregations failed to do—whip the national professional football league titlholders.

In 1934 the Chicago Bears won, 5 to 0, through Jack Manders' field goal and safety.

Bierman, in a poll which awarded three points for first choice, two for second and one for third, amassed 3,872,251 points. Layden had 2,784,241 points, while McMillin garnered 2,770,643; Little, 2,169,202, and Waldorf, 2,147,020. It was originally planned to have only four coaches. Little, however, revealed that a recent operation will keep him from active work, so he will serve in an advisory capacity as Waldorf works on the practice squad.

Pans Name Players

The fans who selected the all-star squad named these 11 players to start the game: Ends, Keith Topping, Stanford, and Wayne Miller, Notre Dame; Tackles, Truman Spahn, Southern Methodist and Dick Smith, Minnesota; guards, Vernon Oech, Minnesota, and Paul Tangora, Northwestern; center, Gomer Jones, Ohio State; quarterback, Riley Smith, Alabama; halfbacks, Bill Shakespeare, Notre Dame, and Jay Bennett, Chicago; fullback, Eshelton Belse, Minnesota.

Bierman, who will have seven of his 1935 Minnesota aces on the squad, polled 1,047,173 first place ballots, 247,284 for second place and 236,104 for third. Layden polled 684,327 first-choice votes.

Dawson and Little Trim Smith, Thomson

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Jimmy Dawson and Lawson Little, both of Chicago, nosed out Horton Smith, Chicago, and Jimmy Thomson, Shawnee, Pa., in their quarter golf match here. The best ball card gave the former pair 68 strokes to the latter's 67.

Thomson, noted as a long-distance driver, laid a ball on the green with a tee shot on the 340-yard third hole at the Eastmoreland course. Dawson and Little finished all-square in their 8-hole exhibition.

The foursome competed in the recent \$5,000 Oregon open.

Townsend set forth in a statement that any of his followers who refused to support William Lemke, the Union party candidate for president, would be ousted. Lemke is backed by the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest. Smith is chief of a share-the-wealth group and a frequent companion of Dr. Townsend.

Dr. Wunder said he and Kiefer "are just beginning this fight" and "when we are through the Townsend clubs will own their own movement instead of Dr. Townsend and Gilmore Young, his pet, who now own it as a private California corporation."

"Lemke," he said, "has not yet endorsed the Townsend plan."

CLEVELAND, Aug. 12.—(AP) Three outspoken champions of the presidential aspirations of William Lemke; Dr. F. E. Townsend, Rev. Fr. Charles E. Coughlin and Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith—for the second time in less than a month will share this week a Cleveland convention platform.

The trio cemented a political alignment behind the Union party candidate at the Townsend convention last month. Last night, it was announced that Dr. Townsend and Rev. Mr. Smith would speak Saturday at Father Coughlin's national union for social justice convention.

Priest To Speak

The Detroit priest is scheduled to talk at the opening session Friday morning and again Sunday with Rep. Lemke at a closing rally in Cleveland's lakefront stadium. Also on the Friday program is Senator Holt (D-W.Va.), another New Deal critic.

President Roosevelt will make a four-hour visit to the city Friday. Tentative plans call for Mr. Roosevelt to give an informal luncheon address before about 400 invited guests.

James A. Farley, Democratic national chairman, said in Washington yesterday the time of the visit had no political significance.

BARNSTORMING 'CONS' PLAY MILJUS' PUPILS HERE NEXT TUESDAY

HUSKY OARSMEN WIN FIRST HEAT

GRUNAU, Germany, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The University of Washington won the first heat in Olympic eight-oared rowing competition today, defeating Great Britain in a split-second finish.

Trailing by a few feet entering the final 100 meters, the Huskies overhauled the British in the last two strokes and set up a new course record of 6 minutes, eight-tenths seconds. Great Britain caught in 6:02.1, also was under the old course standard of 6:09 flat.

The other three crews faded out of the picture while the Americans were outfighting the British.

The former course record of 6:09 was held by a Hungarian crew.

The Hungarians won the second eight-oared trial in 6:07.6, beating the Italians and Canadians in that order.

The United States entry in Olympic rowing competition for pair-oared shells with coxswain finished sixth.

Germany was winner, timed in 7:27.3 for the 2,000 meter course.
