Aids Education

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Less hard hit than the east and mid-west states by adverse conditions four western states will produce 45 per cent of the country's apple crop this year, the agriculture department prophesied today.

Although western harvests will not touch 1935 or five-year average marks, the production of percentage will jump from 32 per cent last year to this year's estimate because of the poor prospects in other parts of the country.

"Prospects are relatively more favorable in the Pacific coast and Rocky Mountain group of states where damage from late frosts was less severe than in eastern areas," the department report said.

The 1936 estimate of 102,487,000 bushels is the smallest crop since 1921.

The production figures for major apple-growing states, five-year average, 1935 production and indicated 1936 production, by bushels, respectively, include:

Idaho, 5,066,000; 5,934,000, and 2,970,000; Washington, 33,510,000, 30,878,000 and 27,090,000; Oregon, 5,082,000; 3,500,000, and 4,200,000 and California, 10,156,000; 9,889,000 and 5,694,000.

18 ACRES OF FLAX PAY FARMER \$1680

SALEM, Aug. 12.—(P)—The year 1936 in the Oregon flax industry promises to be one of the most profitable in its history, L. L. Laws, in charge of the state flax plan, reported to Governor Martin today.

Laws said that approximately 5,500 tons of flax had been delivered at the four plants.

One Marion county rancher, with 18 acres planted to flax, raised 35 tons, for which he received a check for \$1,680. Of this amount \$45 a ton was paid by the state and \$5 by the federal government.

Laws reported he recently sold 1,000 bushels of flax seed at \$2.10, the highest price in a number of years.

OREGON FIELD SEEDS FOR DROUGHT SECTORS

CORVALLIS, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Oregon probably be called upon to supply a larger proportion of the country's field seed crops this year than usual because of middle west drought conditions, E. R. Jackman, extension agronomist at Oregon State College, said today.

In many cases, alfalfa, clover and grass seed crops in the drought area have been practically ruined, which Jackman says will doubtless have an effect on prices for the 1936 supply. Seed crops of which Oregon has a virtual monopoly, such as bent grass, are not expected to be affected as much.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Ada B. Boyd, 67, pioneer of Wallawa county died at her home Monday evening. Funeral services will be held at Wallawa this afternoon. Born in Kansas, Mrs. Boyd moved to Wallawa county 61 years ago, residing there until death. She leaves her widowed husband, William H. Boyd, four sons and five daughters of Wallawa, and another daughter in Iowa.
