taxes he had in mind, he did not say. Morgenthau, however, told newsmen he referred to "miscellaneous taxes," commonly called "nuisance taxes."

Budget Balance speeded "Business improvement is at such a pace that we are going to reach a balanced budget much earlier than we expected," Harrison said.

Doughton said that "improvement in business all over the country has had two effects—increased revenues and decreased relief costs," adding: "This is tending to bring expenditures and receipts together, with receipts going up and expenditures coming down."

Harrison emphasized that experts of the joint congressional committee on internal revenue taxation would be instructed to begin the survey immediately, in cooperation with experts of the treasury.

At a later press conference, Morgenthau said that no cut in liquor taxes was contemplated, but beyond that declined to say what taxes were specifically in mind.

"Lots of taxes cost almost as much money to collect as they bring in revenue," he said.

full custody of the four-year-old child.

Loses Final Word "I gave the baby to Miss Astor more than half the time, anyway," said Dr. Thorpe, "but if any issues arose I had the final word."

Dr. Thorpe said he did not contemplate any legal action against George E. Kaufman, Broadway playwright, for failing to appear as a witness although subpoenaed by Dr. Thorpe's lawyers.

When Kaufman did not come to court on schedule Monday, Judge Knight issued a bench warrant for his arrest.

Miss Astor testified during the custody hearing that she told Dr. Thorpe of her friendship for Kaufman and that he "condoned" it.

Asked if he believed matters would run along smoothly under the settlement, Dr. Thorpe replied: "I'm no prophet."

Finds Comfort "It is a comforting thought," he said, "that the court would have the final say if any argument arose."

The diary has been in possession of Dr. Thorpe since he divorced Miss Astor last year. His attorneys made strenuous efforts to introduce it as evidence that the auburn-haired screen actress would be an unfit mother of little Marylyn.

Anderson said the diary contained detailed accounts, punctuated with Miss Astor's fanciful thoughts and philosophy, about her friendship with an assortment of prominent men.

FRANCE ABOLISHES ANCIENT REGENCY CONTROLLING BANK

using the new council's powers for inflation.

The measure fulfilled a campaign promise of Premier Leon Blum, head of the popular front government, to eliminate the so-called "200 families," who it charges controlled the bank.

The change also created such fear for the future of the franc that trading in bank stocks was suspended during some of the parliamentary debate.

The regents professed "great apprehension" for the nation's financial future. They expressed concern that the new regime, if it adopted liberal credit policies, would raise hopes "of generous manna."

Under the bank's expiring 136-year-old control, drawn up by Napoleon, the board of regents has been elected since 1800 by the 200 largest stockholders.

The Blum campaign attack on the "200 families" came from that rule. The leftists charged places in the board of regents were handed down in family dynasties.
