SOVIET JAILS 16 PLOTTING REVOLT

MOSCOW, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Sixteen persons were thrown in prison today by the soviet government in the biggest counter-revolutionary plot to be announced by the government in more than a decade.

Directing the plot, said soviet police who uncovered it, was the exiled Leon Trotsky, now in asylum in Norway.

The government charged that Trotsky was planning a terroristic campaign, including attacks against soviet leaders.

It said he had sent five agents from abroad into Russia to help carry out his plans.

RUETHER'S SUSPENSION REDUCED TO TEN DAYS

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—(AP)—W. C. Tuttle, Pacific Coast league baseball president, reconsidered today his suspension of Walter "Dutch" Ruether, Seattle manager, shortening his term to 10 days instead of the remainder of the season.

Ruether can rejoin his club next Tuesday in San Francisco. He had previously been barred for the rest of the year because of a run-in with Umpire Bill Engeln last Sunday.

DOLE CHILD DIES WHILE MOTHER ON YACHT TRIP

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Michael Dole, two-year-old son of Mrs. Richard Dole of Hawaii, died at children's hospital here today of influenza.

The mother was cruising somewhere off Alaska on a yachting expedition and was only reached by radio last night.

The child is a grandson of James C. Dole, the Hawaiian pineapple king.

COAST STEEL PLANTS ON PROSPERITY PATH

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Pacific coast steel plants appear headed for new records in sales, shipments and production this year.

They have been operating at virtual capacity of equipment during the last 3 to 4 months, and orders continue at high levels.

July bookings by coast plants were well below the big month of June, but were three times those of July last year, with spare tonnage.

COUGHLINITES CHEER YOUTHFUL SENATOR'S CONVENTION ADDRESS

CLEVELAND, Aug. 14.—(P)—The opening session of the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin's National Union for Social Justice convention cheered wildly today an assertion by West Virginia's youthful senator, Rusty D. Holt, that "the money changers have not been driven from the temple."

The 31-year-old senator, a Democrat, making the keynote address of the convention, brought delegates to their feet with this reference to the sixth of Father Coughlin's 16 points—abolition of the federal reserve banking system.

"I can quote no better than from William Jennings Bryan," said Holt. "Bryan said in 1923, 'the federal reserve bank that should have been the farmer's greatest protection has become his greatest foe. . . . If the Wall street speculators are in control of it, it would be better to repeal it.'"

He upheld attempts to "raise the mortgage burden of the farmer," which he said had brought cries of "inflation."

PLOWS FIELDS WHILE BALLOT COUNT WAITS

POCATELLO, Idaho, Aug. 14.—(AP)—After many fruitless telephone calls, unofficial calculators of the primary election reached the wife of a precinct judge in remote southeastern Idaho.

The returns? No, she was sorry she didn't have them. She didn't think Henry had counted the votes yet.

"He's out plowing and has the ballots in his overalls pocket," she explained. Henry was in a field 10 miles from a telephone.

CLARK LEADING FIELD FOR IDAHO NOMINATION

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Mayor Barzilla W. Clark, Idaho Falls municipal power exponent, headed a field of three today in tabulations of Tuesday's Idaho democratic primary gubernatorial nomination race.

With 675 of 797 precincts unofficially reported the vote was: Clark, 97 1/2; Lieut. Gov. O. P. Mix of Moscow, 96 1/2; Attorney General Bert H. Miller, 94 1/2.
