BARBARA STANWYCK APPEARING IN HIT WITH GENE RAYMOND

Walt Disney presents Mickey Mouse with a rival for Minnie's affections in "Mickey's Rival," the new Technicolor cartoon appearing on the same program with "The Bride Walks Out," opening a three-day run at the Craterian theatre today.

Mortimer Mouse brings the "eternal triangle" into Mickey's life, with Minnie-like all women—finding a certain satisfaction in playing upon the two rivals' emotions until Mickey finally succeeds in coming out the winner.

"The Bride Walks Out," one of the season's gayer photoplays, has Barbara Stanwyck starred with Gene Raymond, Robert Young, Ned Sparks and Helen Broderick adding to the fun.

The story shows Raymond as a modern young husband who believes in old-fashioned ideas about marriage. Wedded to Miss Stanwyck, a successful mannequin who has become accustomed to luxury, he prohibits his wife from going to work. Putting the dishes and dandling the furniture gets on Barbara's nerves. She decides to shake the matrimonial bonds and return to modeling.

Young watches the proceedings with a hopeful glint in his eye. His right-and-day pursuit of the luxury-loving wife almost bears fruit until friend husband intends to risk his life in a hazardous South American expedition. How Barbara, aided by Young, plots to make him stay in New York as her husband, is the hilariously rich climax of the film.

Jack London Hit Coming Thursday



Replete with the romance of the far North and filled with the drama of the lawless frontier, "White Fang," Jack London's great sequel to "Call of the Wild," comes to the Craterian theatre Thursday, with Michael Whalen and Jean Muir heading an exceptional cast.

Taking up where "Call of the Wild" left off, "White Fang" weaves a thrilling story of gold and greed, love and danger. Intermingled with the narrative is the biography of Lightning, mighty son of Buck and his she-wolf mate.

Whalen is shown as an adventurer down on his luck, persuaded to act as guide in search of a lost gold mine bequeathed to Thomas Beck and his sister, Jean Muir. The long trek proves too much for Beck and he goes mad, jumping over a precipice while Whalen falls unconscious. When he drops, a pack of wolves see their chance to close in after trailing the pair for days. The leader, however, discovers something familiar in the man-scent and his viciousness chases away the remainder of the pack.

With only the dog as friend, Whalen continues the search and, as Beck, takes over the ownership of the mine he finally discovers. But with the finding of Beck's body, he is accused of murder and the climax comes in a breath-taking rush of thrilling events.

Slim Summerville, Charles Winniger (Cap'n Henry), and Jane Darwell are also featured in the cast.

PENDLETON AREA TO PRODUCE BULK 1936 WHEAT CROP

PORTLAND, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Four counties of eastern Oregon will produce most of the state's wheat this year, judging from studies of the division of crop and livestock estimates of the U. S. department of agriculture.

A breakdown of the division's crop forecasts announced earlier this week showed that the mid-Columbia district, which has contended with the northeastern belt of the state for wheat-growing honors should be considerably under the harvest totals of the eastern counties—Umatilla, Baker, Union and Wallawa.

Estimated production of other state districts, with the 1935 estimate listed first, followed by the 1934 production and the peak year in the last nine follows:

Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill counties—4,030,000, 1,349,000, 1929—4,110,000.

Cook, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine—100,000, 334,000, 1932—381,000.

Crook, Deschutes, Grant, Harney, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Wheeler—2,000,000, 733,000, 1930—1,690,000.

By crops, the division estimate of a wheat production of 20,690,000 bushels for the state is divided with 14,596,000 for winter wheat and 6,094,000 for spring wheat, compared to 10,999,000 bushels of winter wheat last year and 4,504,000 bushels of spring wheat and 1928-32 average of 17,610,000 bushels of winter wheat and 3,601,000 of spring wheat.

LOW PERCENTAGE OF RURAL RELIEF HEADS UNSKILLED

CORVALLIS, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Twenty-one per cent of the heads of families on rural relief who migrated to a cross-section of the state in recent years were unskilled labor, research of the agricultural experiment station of Oregon State college, with the aid of the FERA and WPA, disclosed today.

The study of the agricultural phase of Oregon's relief program showed that a fifth of the families on what the federal government classifies as rural relief came to Oregon since 1930 but only 18 per cent of them were experienced in agriculture. Sixty-four per cent were trained to other trades at 21 per cent had no trade training.

The data were accumulated in six counties—Baker, Clatsop, Crook, Josephine, Polk and Morrow—and disclosed these interesting facts:

The average size of the migrating families was a fraction under four persons.

Fifty per cent settled in the open country, 34 per cent in villages and 16 per cent in cities.

COQUILLE STRIKE ENDS, PAY RAISED

COQUILLE, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—A strike which deadlocked labor and employers since July 28 ended today when pickets ceased their patrol of the Smith Woods Products company mill.

The Sawmill and Timberworkers Union, Local 2770, voted last night, 138 to 30, in favor of an agreement worked out in negotiations between union leaders and company representatives, giving women a small increase in wages and bringing the general scale up to that paid in other coast cedar and fir mills.

Monday, 400 men and women will resume their shifts at the plant, restoring a \$12,000-a-week payroll to the city. George Ulett, vice-president of the company, in announcing the agreement, said the company will speed construction of a new fir and plywood mill to be in operation this fall.

DRUM CORPS TOGA TO KLAMATH FALLS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—in what was estimated to be the closest Legion drum corps competition since 1926, the drum corps of Klamath Falls post No. 8 won first prize in the drum corps competition at Finley field Thursday night. When the final decision of the judges was announced, less than three points separated the standings of the five contesting corps.

Following Klamath Falls' score of 97.10, came Portland with a score of 96.07. Third, fourth and fifth places were taken by Corvallis with a score of 96.62, Astoria with a score of 95.925 and The Dalles with a score of 94.675.

LEGION WILL WAR ON ALL 'ISMS'; FOR COAST RAILROAD

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—The Oregon department of the American Legion committed itself to an "uncompromising fight against communism, fascism, nazism, militarism or any other form of dictatorship and against all subversive activities which tend to invite or which advocate the use of force or violence to overthrow our present form of government." In unanimous adoption of the resolutions presented by the committee on Americanization.

Among other policies approved in the resolution were: Continued program for adequate national defense; any reasonable plan for world peace; opposition to entry in the League of Nations as now constituted; a permanent strict neutrality policy; refusal of future loans to all nations that have defaulted on previous obligations; universal draft law; federal control and regulation of armaments; restriction of immigration for 10 years; registration of all aliens; deportation of alien criminals, and an increase in the size of the Mexican border patrol.

A resolution submitted by Grants Pass Post, No. 28 and Kerby Post, No. 70, was passed by the convention, giving approval to proposed railroad development between Grants Pass and Crescent City. The convention voted approval and endorsement of the project on the basis that it "creates immediate employment, creates a worthwhile resettlement project for the drought victims of the middle-west, opens up a large area in the state of Oregon, and will develop vast resources, and will strengthen the inadequate defense of the mid-Pacific area."

SEEK \$50,000 FOR BLOW WITH BRICK

PORTLAND, Aug. 15.—(AP)—A suit on file in federal court here today sought damages of \$100,000 from Charles D. Arthur, Lakeview, on charges that he struck Michael M. Sullivan with a brick, causing injuries which resulted in Sullivan's confinement in the state hospital at Salem.

Arthur I. Moulton, attorney for Sullivan, said \$50,000 general and \$50,000 punitive damages were asked on the grounds that Sullivan, while attempting to settle a brother's estate and looking for some property, was ordered off a ranch and hit on the back of the head as he turned to walk away.

Moulton said Sullivan was in the state hospital until last July and was living in Modoc county, California.
